TAXIS NOW DRIVE ON APPIAN WAY AND PAST COLISEUM

ROME, June 11.—Taxicabs have just invaded Rome. New brightly painted vehicles similar to those horse-drawn cabs, which have held sway in the capital of the Caesars for centuries.

The taxicab, though welcomed with open arms by the general mass of Romans, has met for years a stonewall opposition for the right to circulate in Roman streets. The 5,000 cab drivers and livery men fought its use and warned the city administration they would be defeated at election if the taxicabs were admitted.

This opposition has in a measure been overcome but there still remains some cab drivers' prejudice against motor vehicles in their business. They have insisted that the chauffeurs be mainly recruited from the cab drivers.

R. L. Gohier, superintendent of the Red Cliff, took a crew of five men up to the mine on Wednesday for the purpose of doing preparatory work necessary for the commencing of development work on the Montrose claim. A camp is being established on the Waterloo claim of which Vinee Lade, well known prospector and mining man of this locality, has been appointed foreman.

John Hovland returned to town recently from sampling his Fish Creek group, consisting of five claims in Alaska territory on Fish creek, one mile from the Salmon river wagon road and at an elevation of about 800 feet from sea level. He reports that he has located a new lead four feet wide with fourteen inches of high grade ore running 300 ounces of silver with a small percentage of zinc.

Specimens from the Raven and Albany claims, of which John Fraser is one of the owners have returned assays as follows: Silver, 104 ounces; Gold, \$1.50; Lead, 33 per cent.

During the month of May 239 miners certificates were issued at the local mining recorders office.

STEEL KING TALKS LABOR AND CAPITAL

Addressed Syracuse University
Today on Economic Problems

SYRACUSE, N. Y., June 13.—

E. H. Gary, chairman of the Board of Directors of the United States Steel Corporation, told the Syracuse University students in a commencement address today that capital is necessary to the progress and prosperity of every country and any people.

The only alternative to it, he declared, was the anarchy or

the facilities for development, improvement, extension and application of natural resources. This could not be done by small contributions of money." In times of war, Mr. Gary declared, it would have been impossible to have fully supplied the needs of the country without recourse to contributions by large capital.

Accumulated Capital.

"Except for the accumulated capital invested in business enterprises and the working capital to maintain and extend them," Mr. Gary continued, "millions of men and women who work for wages or salaries would be without a chance to earn a decent living. To the extent a nation is without capital in a corresponding degree are its industries in a state of decay and its people impoverished and despondent.

"In short, for a desirable and proper degree of comfort, contentment, happiness, advancement in any direction, protection against disease and destruction, every inhabitant of every land is dependent upon individually accumulated capital.

"The only alternative which has been suggested is that the government shall forcibly take possession and control of all capital and distribute the income derived from it amongst the people per capita. This would inject into the natural system of national and individual life a poison which would eventually

Bad Doctrines.

"Growing out of the illogical and condemnatory doctrine above described, is another even worse. It is, and for some months past has been, in practice at places outside the United States. It rejects the right of the individual to enjoy the fruits of natural ability and integrity, of study and mental effort, thrift and economy and it substitutes the law of physical force which permits the strong and powerful to forcibly appropriate all that belongs to another, including property and family.

"This virulent and abhorrent disease, masquerading under different names, has been gnawing at the vitals of Russia. Anarchy is a generic term for it. Sovietism is most commonly used at present. It has spread and destroyed. Its germs purposely have been secretly carried to America and efforts to inoculate our splendid citizenship.

"Capital, whether invested in charitable, religious, educational institutions, or commercial or industrial enterprises, will be protected and, as a corollary, the rights of the people without discrimination will be conserv-

ed.

Restriction of Wealth.

"If it should be urged that certain amounts and possessed by organized capital should be subjected to governmental inquiry and restriction in its use, there might be no objection to a fair and reasonable enactment covering this question, provided organized labor should also be subjected to the same statute.

"The door of opportunity for legitimate advancement is open to both capital and labor. Both should be grateful for the privilege. Neither should be permitted to abuse it."
