CAR SHORTAGE THREATENING

Eighteen Cars Would Have Been Required This Morning Had Boats Stayed—14 Available.

The refrigerator car shortage is on again and, for the first time in some months there were not sufficient cars available this morning to accommodate the list of arrivals. There was 580,000 pounds of halibut offered for sale today requiring 18 cars and there were 14 cars available. Of the 580,000 pounds arriving 243,000 pounds has gone or may go to other ports on account of the low price offered with which the fishermen were not satisfied.

PREPARING FOR A CONVENTION

United Farmers of Alberta to Meet in January—Recommendations Made.

CALGARY, Alta., Nov. 23.—Arrangements for the holding of the United Farmers of Alberta convention here in January are already being made and many suggestions from various locals covering a great variety of subjects have been received by the central office of the organization. Many of the resolutions relate to matters of interior economy, one from the Macleod office—association recommending that a fund be established for the purpose of handling farm products and suggesting that a cold storage plant be built as a start.

An international agricultural conference called by the Canadian Council of Agriculture to discuss vital questions relating to international agricultural trade and tariffs is advocated by the Morrison local. All farmers' organizations throughout the world would be invited to attend, the cost to be met by general membership of various organizations or a straight levy on each organization represented.

A resolution from the Victoria district political association suggests the membership fee be raised to cover the cost of a weekly provincial newspaper to be delivered to all members, while the Stratheona independent political association takes an opposite view stating in their resolution that they are opposed to any increase in membership fees on the ground that farmers are suffering through the drop in market prices. Increased fees the Stratheona local declares, would mean decreased membership.

Co-operative marketing is recommended by the Stratheona association, which suggests that all farm produce be handled through one central organization. The Macleod association calls for an investigation into the cause for so wide a spread between No. 1 Northern and No. 1 red winter wheat. Garland local asks for legislation to prevent any one man being a candidate for more than one constituency during a provincial election.
