KETCHIKAN, Jan. 4.—It took four men to put hand-cuffs on Paddy Shanahan, who was committed to Morningside asylum by Judge Warder last week in the Commissioner's court in the federal jail, when he was told he was to be taken south. Paddy was placed in one section of the jail away from the rest of the prisoners. He got hold of a table knife and fork which he used to great advantage. T. W. McDonald, night patrolman, Lonnie McIntosh, chief of police, W. B. Sharpe and Noah Howell, deputy marshals, were trying to get hand-cuffs on him. He fought like a tiger, and after trying every possible way they at last turned the full force of the fire hose on him. This subdued him in short order.

HANNA IGNORES CONCILIATION

C.N.R. Directors will Not Be Drawn into Dispute Over Order, he says

TORONTO, Jan. 5.—President D. B. Hanna, of the C.N.R., states here that the board of directors did not intend to be drawn voluntarily into the work and operations of the board of conciliation, which was recently appointed by the minister of labor to look into the dispute over order 42, which was issued some time ago in reference to the participation of employees in the political arena. "The board of directors of the Canadian National Railways," said President Hanna today, "notified the minister of labor that they could not consistently with their appointment as directors under which the railways were to be operated free from politics, nominate any one to represent them in this matter. No camouflaging of the question by stating that men have been dismissed can get away from the main issue. "The board of directors of the C.N.R. accepted office on the distinct understanding that politics would have no place in the administration of the railways," continued Mr. Hanna. "We are standing strictly on that declaration."

Explains Order

President Hanna, in an interview in which he was asked if his order forbidding C.N.R. employees from being candidates for political office applied to Secretary R. P. Ormsby, of the C.N.R., who is mayor of Leaside, Ont., made it clear that the order did not include municipal politics. "The order simply deals with partisan politics," said President Hanna, "and has nothing to do with municipal politics. On the contrary, we rather encourage our employees to take a full and keen interest in municipal affairs." Mr. Hanna added that Mr. Ormsby had his full approval in taking special interest in Leaside. The Canadian National Railway shops are in Leaside.
