Emergency Here at Present Time.

There is at present an emergency in the affairs of Prince Rupert district. There is a dull winter staring us in the face and dull times afterwards unless we do something. Our mills have been closed ever since the railway made the freight rates prohibitive so that lumber could not be shipped from the coast to the east.

The work at the shipyard has about ceased, for the big ships are completed and there is nothing on hand except some small repair jobs that will not employ many men.

Mining is at a standstill, and even at Anyox there is little money being paid out beyond an existence stipend.

Fishing is not as bad as the other industries because the people of Prince Rupert bestirred themselves, aided by the member for Lunenburg, and eventually compelled the Government to keep a supply of cars ready for use here.

The Daily News does not mean to insinuate that Colonel Peck did not try to help us to get fish cars. What we do allege is that on the floor of the House last Spring it remained for the member for Lunenburg to voice our need.

Here then is our condition. Everything but the fishing business is at a standstill. Shall we sit back and wait for something to turn up or shall we get busy?

Two Things We May Do.

There are two things we may do at the present time. We may in the first place vote against any candidate that supported the policy which has brought us to the present condition. In the second place we may get busy ourselves and stir things up as we did in the case of the fish cars.

On another page Mr. McIlroy suggests ways and means for improving our condition. His suggestions are worthy of consideration. If we should be so foolish as to return to power the same people who have been there for the past few years, and who have squeezed us dry, we deserve any fate that may befall us.

The One Need of the Present Time.

There is one need more outstanding than any other at the present time. That need is a sympathetic Government at Ottawa. The Liberal Government began the railway and would have made a job of it, but the people relieved them of the duty while it was but half done.

Why? That is what we would like to know. We do not know why, but we know the remedy, and that is to turn out the Government and put the Liberals back to finish the work they commenced and in which they were interrupted.

Philip McDonald, also involved in the stealing, was given eighteen months at Okalla with deportation to the United States when the time is up.

ARCHBISHOP RETURNS FROM GENERAL SYNOD

Tells of Main Features of Church Gathering—Pleased With Railway.

The chief work of the Anglican Synod, which met at Hamilton recently was the final revision of the prayer book, enriching it and modernizing it and allowing somewhat greater latitude in individual cases.

The other important matter dealt with by the synod was an appeal for Christian unity on the line of the Lambeth conference. The Lambeth appeal was endorsed as a basis of approach and a committee of eight was appointed from which was chosen an executive committee of which Archbishop Du Vernet is a member.

The matter of the beneficiary fund was also discussed and action was taken.

The Archbishop was much pleased with the service on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway on which he travelled throughout. He says he found the officials anxious to please and in many cases they went out of their way to make themselves agreeable and to provide for the comfort of the passengers.

In Saskatchewan, thrashing was still in progress, the harvest having been delayed by early rains.
