

LOCAL NEWS NOTES

Catholic Bazaar in St. Andrew's Hall.

Oliver Besner of the Knox Hotel was among the arrivals from the south this morning on the G. T. P. boat Prince Rupert.

T. H. Johnston, manager of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co. of this city, returned from the south this morning on the Prince Rupert.

Mrs. Charles Balagoo and baby accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Astoria returned this morning on the Prince Rupert from a visit to Victoria and Vancouver.

The boilers for the heating plant of the new Provincial government court house, arrived from the South yesterday on the Prince Albert, and are being unloaded today.

The city is to make repairs to the roadway leading from Third Avenue to the steam plant at Gow Bay so that coal may be delivered. The expenditure will be small. A report to this effect from the Board of Works was adopted at the council meeting last night.

The hunting party that left here on Saturday for a week end trip to Pitt Island, consisting of W. Gilson, T. B. Hooper and W. O. Fulton, and over whom there was some anxiety, on account of their failure to return on Tuesday, reached the city safely this morning. Engine trouble was the cause of the delay in their return.

T. Hayashi, Japanese Government Forestry expert, stationed at Port Arthur, was an arrival in the city yesterday on the Albert, and left for the East this morning on the train. Mr. Hayashi's trip is in the nature of a pleasure visit but he is taking a great interest in all he has been able to see in the short time he has been in the city, especially in connection with the establishment of the proposed pulp and paper mill at Seal Cove.

The Rev. W. H. Smith, head of the Presbyterian College, Westminster Hall, Vancouver, who has been in the city for the past few days, on his return from the East, where he has been attending a joint meeting of Theological colleges, left for his home in the south last evening on the S. S. Venture. Mr. Smith while in the city, preached on Sunday night in the Presbyterian Church and attended the Methodist Church banquet on Thanksgiving Day.

CRITICISM OF BOARD WORKS

Taylor Street Petition Again Discussed by City Council at Meeting Last Night.

The petition from W. H. Sherman and twelve others asking for the grading of Taylor Street or the parking of it precipitated another discussion of the condition of city streets and the policies of the Board of Works at the council meeting last night. The petition itself was ordered filed for future reference and the Board of Works was instructed to get out a report on the possibility of putting in a plank walk.

Ald. Perry considered that immediate attention should be given to Taylor Street. A road here was badly needed and the work should be done either from general revenue or under local improvement.

Ald. Dybhavn did not agree with this. He did not favor building new streets when old ones were already in a state of disrepair menacing the public safety.

Ald. Dybhavn could see no hope of the work being done this year.

Blames Department. "If we had a live engineering department this matter would not have gone such a long time," said Ald. Perry. "There are many other cases like it and whenever they have come up, we have been told that they could not be gone on with on account of finances. If the Board of Works had been up to its job they would have been provided for last January in the estimates. This particular Taylor Street matter has been before the council for three years. Now I think the work should be done even if it is charged up to next year."

Ald. Dybhavn replied saying it was not a matter which should affect the estimates but was rather a matter of local improvement.

"Well, that's just the same," from Ald. Perry. "No, it isn't," Ald. Dybhavn. "It is just passing the buck from one council to the other to leave this over," went on Ald. Perry. "I would like to know why this council cannot act on the straight local improvement plan."

Residents Object. Ald. Kerr stated that it was true the matter had been before last year's council. A petition had been presented but there were not sufficient signatures. Three residents of the street had said that if the work was proceeded with they would take action against the city council. That was why it had been left over.

Ald. Parker felt that Ald. Perry's criticism of the Board of Works in this case was uncalled for. The property was not valuable enough to warrant the cost of grading and it was not advisable to build more plank roadways.

Ald. McNeill then rose to defend the Board of Works. Ald. Perry had asked for repairs to Hays Creek bridge and had taken the credit for getting the work done. There were many other streets worse than Hays Creek bridge which he might have reported upon. He thought that Taylor Street was entitled to a sidewalk.

Ald. Dybhavn said this would be all right provided it were done under local improvement. Otherwise it could be done now.

DOLLY VARDEN MINE CLOSED FOLLOWING BREAKING BIG BELT

The Dolly Varden Mine closed down last Monday, according to the Alice Arm Herald. The immediate cause of the close-down was the breaking of the big belt at the power house. It has been uncertain for some time whether the mine would operate throughout the winter. The bridges and washouts on the railroad have not yet been repaired, and the only means of transporting supplies to the upper Kitsault, is by pack horses. It is reported that the Dolly Varden may resume operations again this year, but no definite policy has been decided on.
