Editor's Reply.

Capt. Freeman asks quite proper questions in regard to the candidates and their relation to the electorate.

1. It is with the greatest reluctance that we offer any criticism of the late member and it is not intended to do so now except to give one glaring instance. For many months this port was shamefully treated by the Government in regard to fish cars, yet Colonel Peck showed himself at that time to be a party politician for he said no word in the House of Commons that we could discover against the policy of the Government but voted consistently for it and it remained for Mr. Duff of Lunenburg to voice our needs on the floor of the House. It was largely our own efforts that got us the fish cars and not that of the member, so far as we could discover. Now Colonel Peck says he is independent.

2. Colonel Peck was paid for his services while he was at Ottawa. One year he drew a double fee, which would be \$8,100. There is nothing unfair about making a change if it will be for the benefit of the constituency.

3. This is the first we have heard about patronage. What we want is to have at Ottawa a supporter of the policy of development of Prince Rupert and a man who will voice that policy on the floor of the House. If Stork fails us we will get someone else. We believe that Mr. Stork will do his duty by Prince Rupert at Ottawa and that is the place to have him.
