SAYS RUSSIA HAS NOTHING THAT WE WANT

Paul Milukoff Objects to Trade Relations with Soviet Government

LONDON, Jan. 8.—Professor Paul Milukoff, Russian foreign minister under Kerensky, and considered the leading Russian anti-Bolshevik authority in England, is quoted here as saying: "There is nothing to be obtained from Russia except flax and timber and that has been sold several times over. I cannot imagine that established British firms will consider this a solid basis for trading with a bankrupt country."

Agreeing with American State Department officials at Washington, Milukoff expressed his opinion to the London Globe that the proposed British trade agreement with Russia is "to all intents and purposes, recognition of the Bolsheviki who have never been elected by any vote of the people."

Propagandists

"Trade with the Bolsheviki will only intensify the danger of Bolshevik doctrines spreading in England," said Milukoff. "With trade will come, first, agents, then 'consuls'—all trained propagandists whose real work it would be to hasten social revolution."

Milukoff states that Russia has nothing to offer in exchange for goods. He says that Lenin himself emphasizes that the remaining gold reserve is negligible and would certainly be exhausted in a month or two.

"There is one thing that Lenin and Trotsky cannot stop without admitting the awful disaster they have brought upon my unhappy country—that is, the preaching of world revolution. Everything is subordinated to that end," concluded Professor Milukoff.

POLISH MUNITIONS.

WATER NOTICE.

USE AND STORAGE.

TAKE NOTICE that Kitimat Pulp and Paper Company, whose address is 701-2 Vancouver Block, Vancouver, B. C., will apply for a licence to take and use one thousand second feet and to store five hundred second feet of water out of Lowe Inlet River, Lowe Inlet, B. C., also known as Verney Falls, which flows westerly and drains into Lowe Inlet about at its head. The storage-dam will be located at (1) Lowe Inlet, (2) Upper Lake, (3) Simpson Lake. The capacity of the reservoir to be created is about 250,000 acre feet and it will flood about 4,000 acres of land. The water will be diverted from the stream at a point about at the head of Lowe Inlet and will be used for power purpose upon the land described as Kumb-o-wa-dah Indian Reserve No. 3 and crown lands.

This notice was posted on the ground on the 23rd day of November, 1920. A copy of this notice and an application pursuant thereto and to the "Water Act, 1914," will be filed in the office of the Water Recorder at Prince Rupert.

Objections to the application may be filed with the said Water Recorder or with the Commissioner of Water Rights, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B. C., within thirty days after the first appearance of this notice in a local newspaper.

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In the Letter Box

QUEEN CHARLOTTE ISLANDS MAIL SERVICE

Sandspit, Q.C.I.
Editor Daily News—I am writing to you with a view to airing my mind in the hope of a remedy being effected by the authorities who may be responsible, a grievance to which the public of several of the settlements on these islands are subjected, namely, the irregularity of mails between these islands and the mainland.

I have been on a visit to these parts since the middle of August, and although, according to the steamship schedule, dated August 27, 1920, to be in force from Sept. 5, 1920, to Jan. 12, 1921, which I have before me, there should be a regular fortnightly service, north and south bound, there have been to my knowledge two changes made without any notice being given beforehand to the post office in which I am principally concerned.

Notify Residents

My main contention is that since the steamship company has issued a schedule for a certain period it is the duty of that company to see that it is adhered to, or timely intimation should be given of the alteration to all postoffices, so as to allow the postmasters time to notify the residents. If this is not done he makes up his mail bags in time, according to the latest schedule issued by the steamship company and unless the steamer does arrive on time, the mail bags having been made up and closed, any other correspondence which might be written in the meantime is subject to unnecessary delay in being despatched, especially where there is no telegraphic communication or wharf accommodation. This is very inconvenient.

Long Watches

In this particular place where I am at present residing, it means that not only are mails delayed, but a continual watch has to be kept night and day for the possible arrival of the steamer, so as to get the bags out in time by small boat. This is a distinct and, to my mind, unnecessary hardship during winter.

Apart from the mail inconvenience, it is a great annoyance for passengers, who to my knowledge have in some instances had to wait and watch for the boat for as
