Newly Organized Band Made Its

There was a good turn out of
veterans and their friends at the
smoker held by the Great War
Veterans' Association in the
rooms on Third Avenue last
night. The feature of the enter-
tainment provided was the initial
appearance of the newly organized
band in public performance. There
are twenty members now under
the capable direction of R. Green-
field and their selections last
night were rendered in most cred-
itable and pleasing style. Indeed,
great progress has been made in
the few weeks since the band was
organized and it is becoming a
body that will be a credit to the
city as well as to the association
under whose auspices it has come
into existence.

Athletic Outlook

President J. H. Kelly was the
chairman at last night's meeting
and in making his opening ad-
dress, he touched on athletics in
the city and the part which the
G.W.V.A. had taken and intended
to take in that line. He regretted
the circumstances that had caused
the association to make poor
showings in the basketball, whist
and billiard leagues, but with the
closing down of the drydock in
the fall many of the best players
in each series had left the city
with the result that interest had
waned.

Football Ambitions.

Mr. Kelly wished to assure the
various leagues that the inten-
tions of the association had been
ambitious and he was confident
that future showings would be
better. Particularly in football
the G. W. V. A. was out for the
season. The president also ap-
pealed for the support of the
citizens as a whole for the band
which was now getting along so
splendidly. Shortly a big band
concert and smoker will be put on
in one of the theatres. Next week
the semi-annual meeting of the
association will take place when
future policies will be outlined.

At the concert last night the
band rendered "Naval Militia"
march, "Piedmont" overture,
"Love-lane" waltz and "Boss de
Commande" march. The selec-
tions were received with much ap-
plause and several encores were
demanded. Ed. Ross, Robert
James, George Gray, E. W. Davis,
R. Robertson, H. Pallinson and
Captain Formby gave solos, Jack
Stewart gave a step dance, Algie
Hunter and Jack Newman mono-
logues, while James Peyton ren-
dered a delightful cornet solo, ac-
companied by the band. In the
course of the evening humorous
refreshments were dispensed.
