\$254.216.98 meneral taxes for the year and the collections had totalled \$207.925.30, or 82 per cent. These figures compare fevorably with 1919 when there was a levy of \$175,606,51 with \$139,401,85 collections, 79 per cent. In 1918 the levy was \$161,137.08, collections \$101,-137.08, or 63 per cent. The local improvement beer for the very had been \$59,486.35 with cullections of \$12,903.16 or 72 per cent. The levies in 1919 and 1918 had been a similar amount with collections 59 per cent and 57 per cent respectively.
