## Extra Session of Legislature.

While it seems like an extra expense calling the Legislature together in the autumn, when they are to meet early in the year in regular session, the necessity lies in the desirability of taking action before the municipal year commences in order that the municipal councils may be able to arrange the finances in their budget.

We have before expressed our opinion that the municipalities ought to so arrange their finance that they will not have to come back at the Legislature. At the same time it must be admitted that it would look bad for any of them to default on their bond interest and would make it difficult for all municipalities to finance their undertakings in future. It is difficult enough at present. If the municipalities think the Legislature will back them whenever they get into trouble, however, it will not make for careful financing.

There is a general feeling that municipalities do not get as good service from employees as do private employers. There often is not that careful attention to duties and enthusiasm for the work that marks the service of private corporations. Sometimes corporations get that way but as soon as the dividends fall off there is a house cleaning, as has been the case with the Granby Company within the last year. It is much more difficult to clean house in a municipality than in a private concern. Prince Rupert is one of the few municipalities that came through the boom and the depression which followed it without financial embarrassment.

## Aldermen Not Always Careful.

Aldermen who undertake municipal duties as a hobby in their spare time are not always as careful of the finances as they should be. Money is voted for things that a private concern would not think of doing. Pressure of opinion influences them more than it should. There is always somebody with an axe to grind. Jobs are found for men and women who should not get them. All this tends to extravagance. It is difficult to check this.

The solution of the problem seems to be in the placing of a manager in charge of municipal affairs and giving him an absolutely free hand and demanding results. Municipal legislators should have nothing to do with the executive end of the business. It is too big and complicated for them.

## C. P. R. Interest In Stewart.

The announcement made on Saturday that the C. P. R. has taken up its option on the Stewart short line of railway up the Bear River proved most interesting to people here. Although it comes in rather a round about way, we believe it to be correct. It seems to be the intention of the big corporation to tap the Groundhog coal areas and to ship the product by way of Stewart. This of course will give a decided fillip to business at the mining camp and will also interest people in the mines of the Bear river and the more remote interior. If there is to be a railway up the Bear River valley, and this railway is to be operated, there will be a means of getting out ore which does not at present exist.

When Sir Donald Mann was here nearly two years ago, he told a Daily News representative that he was through with railroading. He had done all he intended to do. This accounts for the sale of the short line and charter to the C. P. R. This line will be built primarily to the Groundhog coal fields but later it is quite possible it may be extended through the wonderfully rich farming country of the interior and through to the Peace River, connecting with the line to Edmonton. It will be many years before it gets that far, however. If it is sufficient for the present that it will tap the Groundhog country, about which we have heard so much.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

## NICARAGUANS NEVER SEEN AN AIRPLANE

Took Flight when One was Driven Down There Recently

SAN JUAN DEL SUR, Nicaragua, April 4.—There are even yet in remote parts of the world people who never have even heard of an airplane. Some of these people live in the little Nicaraguan village of Gigante where the naval plane NC-6 was forced down by a hurricane while on its flight from San Diego, Cal., to Panama along with about a dozen other planes in January.

They thought the NC-6 was a huge bird, an albatross, which had come in search for some unfortunate mariner who had offended it and they hid in the woods for several hours.

Near the little cove where the NC-6 came down are two ranches. After the Associated Press correspondent had found the missing NC-6, he then visited one of these ranches and asked the women if they had seen the plane arrive. One of them replied:

"Mio Dios, I should think so. At the sight of the horrible thing skipping over the white caps, without flapping its wings and spitting fire from both sides of its body and roaring like 20,000 bulls we all took to the timber where we remained for four hours. We only came out when we saw a foreign gentleman passing near where we were hiding."

The women added that before the great war, when sailing ships used to visit the Nicaraguan coast to load mahogany and cedar the captains had told them of a wonderful bird called the albatross that was an inhabitant of the Southern seas and they supposed, this bird had come after some offending sailor.
