Unemployment And the City.

At the city council meeting last night a delegation from the Central Labor Council stated that there were three or four hundred unemployed in the city at the present time and of this number perhaps fiftweere in serious straits. The city has its public works in such state that immediate employment can be given this week to thirty of that number on the basis of two days per week. This circumstance reflects credit on the departments who are conducting municipal affairs and will prove of great assistance and it is gratifying indeed to know that the city is forehanded enough to have this relief to offer. When the Morse Creek bridge is started and the street surfacing scheme gets under way still * further work will be offering and the city will be able to say that it is doing its duty by the unemployed even if it goes no further.

There Will Be No Bread Lines Here.

After all the city is not a big business proposition and it cannot be expected to deal with the entire problem of unemployment. The provincial and federal governments will have to do their share in providing employment to allay want and they doubtless will do so. It takes longer to get their relief machinery in operation but there will be needed public works that can be proceeded with soon and these will offer help. With the city already having schemes under way and promise of assistance from the governments there is every reason to believe that Prince Rupert will be able to cope readily with its unemployment problems and that actual starvation or privation will-not occur here this winter.

Problem is Not

Dire in Prince Rupert. While there is relief in sight for unemployment here, this city should not forget that it is fortunate in regard to the problem. Great numbers of unemployed do not flock here and make themselves indigent upon the support of the municipality like they do in larger towns. This is not a gathering place for toggers from the lumber camps, miners from the mines and unemployed from the farms. They assemble in the larger places and these are the places where there is a real and dire problem to face. When one looks upon the question in this light we must realize our fortune. Times may seem quiet here but with no prospect of bread lines or public shelters the people can consider themselves blessed. While business may seem slack there is nothing to do but to hold tightly on and in the spring industry will open up and we will again be more fortunate than larger places.

Section 2 Bridge Contract Let.

The awarding of the contract for the building of the Morse moval of Creek bridge will be a source of gratification to the residents of victoria, B. C., or District Forester, Prince Section 2. They have been long promised this utility and have patiently awaited it, but now it will soon be under way. The entire city will be benefited by it for it will prove invaluable to business people in effecting their deliveries and will shorten the run to this end of the city as well as make it safer. Section 2 is rapidly becoming one of the city's most important residential sections and is already the location of many homes! It has good plank roads at the present time and with the completion of the bridge it will be in good shape from the standpoint of streets. The main thoroughtares in Section 1 are the ones that are in the worst need in the city, but with the laying of tarvia they should also be in good shape.

It is a simple and cheap operation to ground the wires properly.
