## FISH ARRIVALS NOW EQUAL CAR SUPPLY

Boats in Today Will Fill All the Available Refrigerator Cars; More Needed.

Habitat is continuing to come in good quantities to this port and this morning three carloads were bought at the Fish Exchange for eastern shipment. There are five cars in today and one is reported for tomorrow. With the three being used today and the Commonwealth in with 80,000 pounds, requiring four cars, all the available cars will be thus used and more will be required immediately.

Following were this morning's sales:  
Lebanon, 17,000 pounds, and Imperieuse, 10,000 pounds, sold to Pacific Fisheries at 17.3c and 6c.

Eidsvold, 18,000 pounds, and Malamute, 7,000 pounds, sold to the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Co. at 17.2c and 6c.  
Eagle 19,000 pounds, and Alpha 11,000 pounds, sold to the Atlin Fisheries at 16.5c and 6c.  
Saurin sold to the Gold Storage at 16c and 7.5c.
