WOULD MANAGE LOCAL SCHOOLS

Candidates for the School Board Honors Address Electors at Empress Theatre.

Three candidates for the school board were heard last night at the Empress Theatre meeting. They were Mrs. Ling, L. W. Patmore and Mrs. Kirkpatrick.

Mrs. Ling explained that as she had been a teacher she could view school matters from that point of view and as a mother she could see things from the point of view of the parent. She asked for their support.

L. W. Patmore again explained the reason why the school had cost so much. It was the unreasonable delay of the City Council and the dilatoriness of the finance committee, of which Alderman Rochester was a member, that caused the trouble.

Justifies Method. Mr. Patmore justified the method of building the new school which the people by a large majority had approved.

Col. McMordeie, he declared, had already saved to the city half the amount of his salary in freight rates alone by his foresight. The Cold Storage Co. paid 10 per cent for their building but McMordeie was getting only 7 per cent.

Alderman McLennan, who was the local Jeremiah, was the chief critic of the work. There were within measurable distance of finishing the building and it had so far cost \$120,000. It would take about \$30,000 more. He was assured by both Col. McMordeie and Mr. Potter that the whole thing including the architect's fees would not cost more than from \$185,000 to \$190,000 and this was \$35,000 more than it should have cost if there had been no delays.

In Private Life. Speaking of Ald. Rochester, Mr. Patmore said he was a fine man to meet in private life and that was where he should remain.

Other Candidates. Mrs. Kirkpatrick said she had served the city for five years on the school board and had never let anything but illness keep her away from meetings. She was sure Mrs. Ling would make a good trustee.

M. M. Stephens asked for the return of the old board in order that they might finish the job of building the new school.
