CERTIFICATE OF APPROVAL

WHEREAS THE TAYLOR MINING COMPANY LIMITED is a company incorporated under the Companies Act (Cap. 39, R.S. B.C. 1911) its objects and powers as set out in its Certificate of Incorporation published in the British Columbia Gazette of 1910 May 1910, at page 72, extending to and including the construction or operation of works for the supply or utilization of water.

AND WHEREAS the said company did apply on the 5th day of July, 1920, for a license to store in Clearwater Lake 2,000 acre-feet of water and to divert carry and use for a power purpose 50 cubic feet of water a second of the waters of Clearwater Creek and Clearwater Lake tributaries of Kinsult River in the Prince Rupert Water District.

AND WHEREAS the said company did apply on the 5th day of November, 1920, for a license to divert carry and use for a power purpose 15 cubic feet of water a second of the waters of Trout Creek, a tributary of Kinsult River, extending to and including the construction or operation of works for the supply or utilization of water.

AND WHEREAS the said Taylor Engineering Company Limited did sell assign and transfer to the Taylor Mining Company Limited the lands and properties to which the said application was approved and dated the 23rd day of May, 1919, did assign transfer and set over to the said Taylor Mining Company Limited its right title and interest in the said application and authorizations.
