**Co-operation in  
 Practical Way.**

Yesterday the Board of Trade answered five applications for information in regard to farming land in the neighborhood. The applicants were advised to go to Terrace for fruit lands and the Bulkley Valley for farm land. While five is rather many letters to have to answer in one day, a great deal of the correspondence of the secretary of the Prince-Rupert Board of Trade is devoted to giving people advice as to land for farming or gardening purposes.

There have been times when the people of the Interior have said that the city of Prince Rupert did not care anything about them or their development. All the time people are enquiring about land and they are being guided and advised as to the localities where the land is to be found. Much of the success of Terrace and other interior points is due to this co-operation. Prince Rupert people, generally, are anxious to help in any reasonable way.

On Queen-Charlotte Islands there are said to be plenty of lands and a good climate, but there is very little information available as to lands that may be secured and few places where people have made a success of farming. If there were a description of such places with photographs available at the Board of Trade rooms it might be possible to co-operate with them also. At present it seems impossible to send people on a wild goose chase to a place where there is difficulty in getting in and out. It is up to the people on the Islands, if they want settlers, to make it possible for people here to secure accurate information.

**Does the Weather  
 Interfere With Work?**

The question as to what extent the weather interferes with work in this city is often asked. Early in May the work on the Court House was started, and the officials of the company assure us that only six days have been lost since then on account of bad weather. Yet we have considered it a bad summer so far. Men have been working practically full time and the work is proceeding rapidly.

With the commencement of the second story of the structure the work on the buildings assumes a more pretentious air. Given fine weather, there would be no time lost whatever and very soon the concrete framework will be completed.

 If Favorable.**

All readers of newspapers like to read the opinion of the editor if the opinion is favorable to their own views. If it is contrary, they are not so interested. Some people even go so far as to say they do not care to read a paper that expresses views contrary to their own.

**REDUCED FREIGHT  
 RATES DO NOT MAKE  
 PEOPLE BUY COAL**

EDMONTON, July 15.—Reduced freight rates on coal have not stimulated the shipment of Alberta coal during the slack season months, proving no inducement to Mr. Householder to get his winter supply in early, the reduction being received with no more enthusiasm than a man would receive a gift of a straw hat in winter time.

It is apparent, freight officials state, that people will not store their winter's supply of coal in the summer months. Attractive prices seem to offer little incentive, people everywhere being of the opinion that money in hand at this time is worth more than coal in the basement. Shipment of coal at the present time, they point out, would not only keep the mines working toward the limit of their capacity, but would also assist the railways and relieve much of the congestion that is bound to be the outcome of this lack of coal buying.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than at Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
