Message from

Peterboro. While it is never safe to gauge public opinion by the results in any one constituency, it may be safely said, following the general trend of events here and elsewhere, that the life of the present Government will end just as soon as the people have an

opportunity to express an opinion. No personal popularity of a second se candidate or any other consideration will stand in the way of the will of the people being plainly shown when it comes to voting for or against a continuation of the present administration. Even the press despatches, which in the past have usually had a strong Tory bias; now are forced to admit the truth that the people are desirous of a change and suggest that a general election is imminent.

Must Vote Money To Carry on Government.

No money can legally be spent without the consent of the House of Commons. With the close of the financial year, there will be no money available to pay the civil servants and to carry on the other functions of administration. The result is the Parliament must meet and vote sufficient money to carry on before the Government can appeal to the country. To do otherwise would cause confusion.
