Message from Peterboro.

While it is never safe to gauge public opinion by the results in any one constituency, it may be safely said, following the general trend of events here and elsewhere, that the life of the present Government will end just as soon as the people have an opportunity to express an opinion.

Must Vote Money To Carry on Government.

No money can legally be spent without the consent of the House of Commons. With the close of the financial year, there will be no money available to pay the civil servants and to carry on the other functions of administration.

Why so Much Fuss Over Peterboro?

Some people are asking the question, "why so much fuss over Peterboro?" Other constituencies have gone against the Government with no fatal result.

In this country there has been a general weakening. J. H. Burnham, the member for West Peterboro, along with dozens of other members of the House, felt the position of the present Government anomalous.

The Liberals met Mr. Burnham and asked him if elected would he definitely oppose the present Government. Mr. Burnham refused to pledge himself, so the Liberals refused to take chances and put up a candidate of their own.

If the people in Ontario are against the Government, how much more so, as Euclid would say, must the people of the West be against them.

Where Were Farmers in Peterboro Election?

There is no suggestion of a jibe in asking the question, where were the farmers in the Peterboro election? The only reason for mentioning their defeat is because so many people have declared that all Ontario would return farmer candidates.

There should be farmer candidates in large numbers in the next Parliament, not as class candidates, however. We do not want class legislation. Most of the farmers are Liberals and their policy is a good Liberal policy.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

The grazing of livestock on the Crown range without permit constitutes trespass, prohibited by law.
