THE WORKLESS AND "THE RED FLAG"

Editor, Daily News:-

With reference to your visitor of last week, I trust I may be permitted to present a few facts before he heads the local vigilantes in a raid on the "reds." Another glass of the scandalous political monopoly with the beer label on it, and this gentieman would distinguish himself. One can see that he has not missed any meals or lined up for his direct relief, and that to him, this is the best of all possible worlds. There are many hundreds like him in Prince Rupert, and I sympathize with their point of view, having held the same opinions not so very long ago.

The unemployed are not asking him or any private citizen for anything, they do not want anybody's property or to hit anybody over the head. On the contrary it is his type that will be asked to hit them over the head. When the facts are considered, he is really kicking men who are down. We are fighting for our existence with the cards stacked against us. The capitalist has no use for us; the government is cutting down our relief to the minimum in an effort to break our spirit and lower wages. To quote a local official who wrote to the press, "he had nothing but contempt for men who complained about food when they were getting it free." For us to be asked to be content and have our standard of living reduced several times in the last two years is asking the impossible, and men who will not fight for their rights and privileges as human beings, deserve SCHMELING contempt.

The police are against us, judging by the venomous glances directed at us. The average man on the street, like your visitor, is given to ignorant criticism of our aims and Sure He Can Regain Title-In New objects. The minister of the gospel is strangely silent when his path of duty lies clear. The clergyman, individually or collectively, would have great power and influence bringing about reform. Has he lo his public spiritedness? They cannot take cover on the grounds tha hey are forbidden to interfere matters secular.
