Crop Outlook
Is Hopeful.

According to the reports there will likely be a big grain crop on the prairies this year. This should improve the financial situation. Already there is reported to be an improvement in the east but in the west things look rather blue. With big crops there will be a lot of farmers from the prairies come to the coast and other parts of British Columbia. Lumber will be required for building and the demand for fruit and fish will be better. While the crop will not directly help Prince Rupert much, it will do so indirectly as improved financial conditions will make possible for people to develop the mines and go into other lines of business.

It must be admitted that the general financial condition is far from what it should be, but we have had bad times before this and have overcome them. As long as people are fairly careful, refraining from taking too great risks, there should be little trouble. Prince Rupert is in a sound condition and should show substantial progress in the next year.

The influence of the crop may be sufficient to stabilize conditions and bring about the turning point in the financial condition of the west.

Value of B. C.
Fisheries.

An official statement sent out by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics gives the total value of the Canadian fish catch at very close to fifty million dollars, of which British Columbia produced over twenty-two millions. Nova Scotia came second with about thirteen millions.

Practically all the salmon was caught on this coast and much of the halibut. Where we fell down was in the catch of cod, lobsters, herring, haddock and mackerel. The opinion is prevalent that within a few years this condition will be changed. It is stated with more or less authority that there will be a development of the cod and herring fisheries on this coast and that other fish will be used to some extent. It seems a pity that the cod fish taken on the halibut grounds should be thrown back into the sea instead of being utilized in some way.

The Dominion Government controls the fisheries on both coasts and they refuse to give the provincial governments any rights. In view of that it should not be too much to expect that they should take some steps towards developing the fisheries along new lines. Experimental farms are provided for the farmers but no help is given the fishermen except in the salmon fisheries. The establishment of hatcheries for salmon is along right lines, but what is needed is an extension of activities of the department to include the halibut, the cod and the herring. Hatcheries are not needed for these but experiments in catching, curing and marketing might have good results.

During the war the government aided in the marketing of various grades of flat fish. This aid ceased with the close of the war, it being looked upon as purely a measure intended to provide food for the people rather than aid to the fishermen. There was once an effort made to introduce lobsters on this coast but this failed. Beyond the efforts to establish a protective treaty for halibut with the United States, there seems to have been nothing further done for the fisheries. The importance of the industry warrants some money being spent in developing it along new lines and Prince Rupert might take a leading part in efforts to secure this recognition.

Value of Local
Manufactures.

In going through the industrial districts of Vancouver it is interesting to note the large number of manufacturing concerns which are operating there. These are not confined to any particular line of activity, although wood working undoubtedly leads all others. The lumber mills are very conspicuous. Vancouver has done everything possible to encourage these industries and has also induced railways to come in and has given them yardage room and other privileges. The result has been most beneficial. The city of Vancouver is ranking among the big cities of the world because of her progressiveness.

Although Vancouver is already a big city, she does not sit back and trust to luck for the future. Her businessmen are on the job all the time and are reaching out for new business. There is a publicity department which is always working and so keen are the people there that they often arouse the ire of neighboring communities. They are loyal to their city all the time and leave nothing to chance in regard to its progress.

Prince Rupert people often amuse themselves by cursing Vancouver. It might be better to take a leaf out of her book and get busy. There is a great need here for local industries, even small ones. The local boat builders should be encouraged especially as this is a natural corollary to our greatest basic industry.

MUST BUILD ON
RIGHTEOUSNESSSo Says Dr. Grant in Sermon on
Patriotism at Presbyterian
Church.CONTRAST BETWEEN
THIS CITY AND CHINAIf We Go on As We Are Going
We Shall Perish Declares
Preacher.

"The nation which brings God into its national affairs will succeed, but the nation that fails to do so will perish from the face of the earth." That was a statement made at the Presbyterian Church last night by Rev. H. R. Grant, D. D. in a sermon on "Patriotism." He emphatically asserted that it was only by building a nation on the eternal principle of truth and righteousness that it could succeed and endure.

Dr. Grant touched lightly on the Oriental question for purposes of illustration. He said he favored the Oriental nations developing in their own country and receiving all the help we could give them, but he warned the people here that a country like China could not be kept back. He told of a church in Honan that seated 1600 people and that was filled and emptied every hour of the day on the Sabbath. Here someone who was interested had found out that on one Saturday night 1600 people had attended the local theaters while the next day not more than 300 were seen in all the churches.

Who Serve Devil.

"If we go on as we are going we shall perish," declared the preacher. "There is no question about it. The people who bring God into the national affairs will succeed while those who serve the Devil will perish. We have seen it many times in individuals and in nations."

Dr. Grant in opening took a

fling at the people who go to church just to be respectable.

He said there was much responsibility that went for religion. This was of no effect. There must be the power of the living God making for righteousness.

Foreswore The Eternal.

The speaker said he had never known a time when men disowned God as they did today. He never knew a time when they

would be no life. Problems were the flutterings which were the sign of life. He urged that we meet the problems of Canadian life looking forward to a greatness for Canada which shall make her supreme.

Need of Patriotism.

The security of the institutions and life of the nation depend on the integrity of the people. That was the reason for the need of patriotism. People must put Canada before self. If in the

nation there was fifty per cent integrity it would mean stability of the institutions, and integrity was built on the power of the eternal. In Russia people had tried to settle problems by revolution but it could not succeed because those who were put out would immediately begin to plot to get back. When God was made the foundation of national life the matter would be settled. Some people looked on the Church as old-fogey but he urged that there was but one way to settle the old disputes and that was to meet on common ground, the common ground of truth, honesty and integrity, each one taking his rightful share.

Fundamentals.

In conclusion Dr. Grant quoted from a book "Fundamentals of Prosperity" where the writer gives the opinion of the president of the Argentine Republic that the reason for the prosperity of North America over South America was that the Spaniards came to South America searching for gold, whereas the pilgrim fathers came to find God.
