New Liquor Act  
Draft Completed.

A Canadian Press dispatch published today says there will be an effort to give the privilege of selling beer and light wines in hotel diningrooms and in clubs. That is not what the people voted for and, as we understand it, will not be part of the bill to be introduced by the Government. There is little need of such a provision. People are now accustomed to taking their meals without beer and wine and for the sake of those who use hotel diningrooms and to whom the odor of beer is most objectionable, this should not be allowed.

The chief objection, however, is to the selling of beer and light wines in clubs. There is absolutely no excuse for this. If there is to be provision for selling liquor in sealed packages by the government there is no need whatever for a further privilege being granted to clubs. Some of the worst drinking in the past has been in the semi-secrecy of the clubs, and women especially will be opposed to any concession being granted along those lines. The people voted for government sale. That they must have. The people did not vote for the sale of beer and light wines in clubs.

## Fish Eaters Are

## Well Developed.

If the assurance of food experts is not sufficient one may very easily procure concrete evidence by studying the physical and mental status of people who have been accustomed to eating fish. Fishermen themselves, whose diet consists very largely of fish, are living testimony to the muscle-building nourishment which it affords. The Japanese have been for many years steady and consistent consumers of fish. Today it is doubted if there is another race of people so well developed physically and at the same time so mentally astute.

Drawing attention to our own fish resources it should be pointed out that fish from our waters are the most palatable to be found anywhere. Authorities state that the frigidity of the water about our shores is responsible for this. Then we have better fish and more fish than nations which utilize it to a much greater extent. Is that good business from a national standpoint or practical economy in the household?

## Fish Has Considerable

## Nutritive Value.

A comparison of meat prices with fish prices is likewise no indication of their comparative nutritive worth. Sir James Crichton-Browne, M. D., D. Sc., L. L. D., F. R. S., etc., etc., who is acknowledged to be one of Great Britain's foremost food experts, has given the following testimony as to the food value of fish:

"It may be estimated that, as regards fat, one and a half pounds of fish are equal to one pound of lean beef in nutritive value, and that in the nutritive nitrogenous material the flesh of fish is only from two to four per cent poorer than that of meat. But the price of fish is considerably less than that of meat. It is for equal nutritive value exceedingly cheap when compared with beef and mutton. It cannot be too strongly insisted on that, for working people of all classes—those who work with their heads as well as those who work with their hands—fish is an economical source of energy necessary to enable them to carry on their work, and that for children and young persons it furnishes the very stuff that is needed to enable them to grow healthy and strong."

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

BLACKS ASKING  
FOR PROTECTION

Election of Harding Political  
Triumph for Them, They  
Declare

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—When Warren G. Harding assumes office on March 4 next as President of the United States, he will have plenty of problems to face, some of them old and some new. Included in the latter category will be the demands for recognition by the negro element of the country. The black population is estimated at 12,000,000. The recognition they demand is a share in political appointments. They are also asking for legislation to protect them in their political rights.

In this era of demands for "self-determination" the negro thinks he sees his opportunity. One element of the colored population has been holding conventions and electing a "provisional president of Africa" as well as a "leader of the African race in the United States." But the majority seem content to consolidate their position on the continent and secure privileges which were nominally, but never really, granted them as a result of the Civil War. Negroes claim that the result of the presidential election of last November was a triumph for them.

## Solid South

Since the days of "Linkum" the southern negro has been a staunch Republican. But the southern white man has been a solid Democrat, so that the negro vote did not bring in much in the way of results. However, last November a lot of southern white men saw fit to change their politics and the "solid Democratic South" was shaken to its foundations. Some of the states actually went Republican for the first time. Others were held by the Democrats by the narrowest majorities. Everywhere the Republican party made great gains. This gave the negro Republican a standing that he never had before, and now he is trying to make the most use of it.

## Chance for Office

When Mr. Harding assumes office in March he will find the representatives of the negro waiting on the steps of the White House. They will ask him to give the black man a chance for public office. They will remind him that a former Republican president, Theodore Roosevelt, broke the ice in this respect and ask for a resumption of the Roosevelt policy and an extension of it. Roosevelt appointed negroes to office, but preferred to do so in the northern states, where the feeling against the blacks was not as keen as it is in the South. His action in entertaining Booker T. Washington at the White House created a great deal of criticism at the time.
