



FIERCE CYCLONE DEVASTATES OLYMPIC SLOPE

NEW PAPER MILL AT PRINCE GEORGE IS TO COST AN IMMENSE SUM

West Slope of Olympics were Struck by Terrific Cyclone

Damage to Timber said to be \$10,000,000; Farms Destroyed and Stock Kil'd, according to Word Reaching Seattle

SEATTLE, February 7.—First reports of a cyclonic storm which swept the west slope of the Olympic Mountains, cutting communication, have been received here by L. Smith & Co. Farmers of Jefferson county report that a hundred families are short of supplies. Scores of farms in the course of the storm have been practically destroyed and the stock killed.

The injury to standing timber has been immense, it being estimated that \$10,000,000 worth has been destroyed.

TARIFF WAR IS IMMINENT IF CONGRESS ACTS

Imm says Canadian Agricultural Interests will be Protected

HAMILTON, Ont., Feb. 7.—Hon. S. F. Todmire, minister of agriculture, in a speech to the agricultural section of the chamber of commerce, said if the duty Tariff Bill becomes operative in the United States the Canadian Government will retaliate in kind. Canadian agricultural interests will be adequately protected, he said.

PLANS BEING COMPLETED FOR PRINCE GEORGE PAPER MILL

any Prominent Eastern Lumbermen connected with new tenure which is to cost from Seven to Eight Millions

VICTORIA, February 7.—The plans for the pulp and paper mill at Prince George, which is to cost between seven and eight million dollars, are being completed here with Government officials by Robert Thyurist, of Dome Creek, a member of an eastern lumber and timber syndicate.

The capacity of the new mill, when completed, will be 200 a day. Members of the syndicate include Frank P. Jones, Montreal financier; Angus McLean, of Bathurst, lumberman; B. Preisch, of Buffalo, president of the New York Lumber Co.; several other Ottawa Valley lumbermen.

Prince George has been chosen as the site for the mill because pulpwood is there and also because of the advantage in the latter of freight rate to the prairies over the coast rates. They expect to cater especially to the prairie market.

S. S. MAGOFFIN IS BACK FROM EXTENDED TRIP EASTERN CITIES

Wallace Submitted Lower Tender For Ship Completion Than His Company.

Mr. and Mrs. S. S. Magoffin returned to the city on last evening's train after an extended visit to the east. Mrs. Magoffin was accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Boalt, of St. Paul, who will visit here indefinitely.

Mr. Magoffin was at Ottawa in connection with the local shipbuilding contract and reports that the contract was let to Wallace's at a lower tender than his company had submitted. In Ottawa, it is understood, that operations here are to commence immediately.

Mr. Magoffin also visited New York, Montreal and Winnipeg. There is a lot of unemployment generally but the situation is being ably coped with by the government and others. The financial situation shows signs of improvement.

GOVERNMENT WORKING ON OIL REGULATIONS SUITABLE FOR NORTH

Legislature Opens Victoria Tomorrow

Moderation Act to be passed at Session providing Government Sale in Sealed Packages; Other likely legislation

VICTORIA, February 7.—The chief feature of the first session of the fifteenth Legislature of the Province of British Columbia which opens tomorrow afternoon will be the introduction of the new liquor control act to take the place of the present Prohibition Act. Another feature is the possibility of Mrs. Mary Ellen Smith, M. L. A., of Vancouver being elected speaker of the House. If she is chosen she will be the first woman speaker of any legislature in the world.

Other questions that will come up will be:

Increased aid to municipalities.

Provisions for the superannuation and pensioning of civil servants.

Efforts on behalf of chiropractors to break the professional monopoly of qualified and licensed doctors.

Proposals of the Premier to amend the Elections Act to make it a punishable offense for any person to register the names of voters and then fail to turn in the names. Many persons were disfranchised at the recent election through the practise.

Draft of Liquor Act.

It is understood the draft of the Moderation Act has been completed and that it is framed along the lines the people voted for in October. The Government will sell in sealed packages. Hotel men will make an effort to secure the privilege of selling beers and light wines and club men may also ask for a limited license.

Financial aid to municipalities may be granted through the operation of the Moderation Act, in that the Government may provide for a fifty-fifty split of the profits of all liquor sold in each municipality.

UNITED STATES STOPS ENLISTING MORE SOLDIERS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—A resolution directing the stoppage of enlistments until the regular army has been reduced to 175,000 men has been passed over the president's veto by Congress. This is the first concrete step toward the curtailment of armaments and is an indication of the general feeling of the nation in this regard.

ONE KILLED ON NATIONAL RLY.

Engine and Express Car Derailed and Engineer is Victim—Strikes Slide.

KAMLOOPS, Feb. 7.—The Canadian National Railway passenger train was partly derailed when westbound at a point about 150 miles east of Vancouver. As a result Engineer Johnson is dead and Fireman Middleton injured, while Expressman Holmes is slightly bruised. The engine and express car Number 1 was derailed as a result of striking a rock slide.

GUILTY OF MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—Mrs. Louise Peete was found guilty of murder in the first degree for slaying Jacob Charles Denton. The penalty for this offense is life imprisonment.
