GENERAL LECKIE TO WORK STEWART CLAIMS

Has Recently Secured Option on Columbia and Excelsior Groups.

General R. G. Edwards Leckie has recently secured an option on W. W. Rush and Arthur Bagg on their claims, Columbia, Evening Sun, Sentinel and Salient, known as Columbia Group, also Excelsior and Eagle, known as the Excelsior and Eagle, known as the land Canal News. Both groups are situated on the middle fork of Glacier Creek, eight miles from Stewart.

According to the terms of the option a considerable amount of development work is to be undertaken this season, to commence not later than June 1, on the Columbia Group, and on the Excelsior work is to be commenced on or before July 15. Mr. Rush will superintend the work.

While the option covers both groups, it is so drawn that if after spending \$10,000 in development work the purchasers wish to drop one group and retain the other, they may do so, upon making to the vendors a substantial cash payment on December 31, 1924.

WIRELESS STATIONS PRAIRIE PROVINCE

Twelve Recommended in Northern Manitoba by Professor Wallace

WINNIPEG, Mar. 10.—The establishment of a chain of twelve wireless stations in Northern Manitoba, at an estimated cost of \$55,000, is recommended by Professor R. C. Wallace, commissioner for the north country in his annual departmental report.

Commissioner Wallace is of the opinion that such a system of wireless communication is highly desirable for the successful development of the north country. The mining possibilities depend very largely on the ability of people in the country to keep in constant communication with the outside world, the commissioner states, especially during the between season periods while the spring break-up and the fall freeze-up are in process each year.

A large station is already situated at The Pas and Commissioner Wallace recommends that another be built at Piquoienei and ten smaller ones at intermediate points.
