DUBLIN CUSTOMS HOUSE NO MORE

Completely Destroyed by Incendiaries-National Documents Lost.

DUBLIN, May 26. The famous Dublin customs house has been burned down by Sinn Fein incendiaries. One was killed and several were burned as the building was consumed by the flames. Fifty persons have been arrested in connection with the affair.

Entry was forced into the building by those who started the conflagration. Others held up the firemen and prevented them stiting the blaze.

Invaluable national documents and records were destroyed, it having been impossible to remove them to safety.

Smouldering Ruins.

Nothing but smoking ruins today mark the site where the historic customs house stood before it was burned vesterday afternoon by the raiding party of civilians whom it is believed were Sinn Feiners. Mahon, a customs official, was among those who were killed in the fight in and around the buildings.
