DR. CLARK OF RED DEER ON RAIL QUESTION

No Royal Road Betterment Situation—Should Increase Business and Stop Leakage.

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, June 7.—"There is no royal road to the betterment of our railway situation," declared Dr. Michael Clark, M. P. for Red Deer, speaking before the Canadian Club here Monday night. "Conditions cannot be helped by the waving of a magic wand. The railway problem is part of the national problem and can only be solved by fundamental business qualities which invariably lead to success in any human endeavor. There is a demand, in the first place on our courage. We must bravely face the facts.

"The increase of motor traffic and prohibition has seriously affected the income of the railways. People who relieved the tedium of long journeys by glass of wine to dinner, supplied by the railway companies, carry the money to the end of their journey to help pay their water rates. This may be bad or good, but the fact remains that if we cease to mail barley, less will be grown and less carried.

Expense Inflation.
 "A potent cause of present disaster is to be found in the inflation of wages and running expenses during the war period. Time will bring some readjustments in these matters, but these readjustments must be brought about carefully.

"What can be done at once along certain lines would bring immediate betterment in the condition. In the first place, management can be improved so as to save money, which is as good as making it. It is freely rumored that the Canadian Pacific Railway is carrying paying passengers over certain lines, while over corresponding lines the National Railway is carrying little but deadheads. This may or may not be an exaggerated statement. We do know that special cars and passes to our legislators, federal and provincial, and their sisters and their cousins and their aunts entail expense and curtail income. The duty of the management is clear. A bankrupt concern ought not to be, and cannot be for long a charitable institution.

Challenge to Patriotism.
 "The important things, however, are to increase business and stop leakages. To do these things is a challenge to our patriotism. Canada needs a citizenship in some small degree worthy of those who gave their lives for her—a citizenship from parliament downwards of men and women who will resolutely set themselves to merge their own interests completely in the national interests. Canada is worth living for. And if we work incessantly for her in a spirit of unselfishness and devotion to the public good, she will rapidly become incomparably the country which is best worth living in."
