### YACHTING CLUB MOVE HAZELTON

*River Steamer Has Been Put  
on Grid Further in Cove.*

In order to eliminate any possibility of her sinking in the event of the bad condition of her hull, the old river steamer Hazelton, now used as a club house of the Prince Rupert Rowing and Yachting Club, was moved on the high tide of Monday night to a specially built pier where she now sits solidly and will remain. The grid is still further in the cove a short distance from the old location of the float and her hull has been opened that the water will flow in and out as the tide comes and falls.

The floats still remain in the same place and the boats of the members will still remain moored to these. The distance for owners of rowboats, canoes and small engines to take their boats and equipment into the club house is only a few feet greater than it was before and the club house is now in a safe position where it will be impossible for disaster to befall it.



## Difference in Weight to Be Twenty Pounds

Dempsey Will Weigh 190 and  
Carpentier 170 in Big  
Battle.

ATLANTIC CITY, June 7.—There will be a difference of about twenty pounds when they meet in the ring a little less than three weeks hence, Dempsey and Carpenter will otherwise appear almost equal in build and stature. If both were to mix in among a few collegiate athletes, probably neither would be picked out as being unusually big or formidable in general make-up. The champion's shoulders are broad while Carpenter's are sloping in shape but otherwise the bodily measurements of the pair do not differ to any marked extent.

Dempsey showed in his bout with Willard at Toledo, when he won the title, that his blows possess enormous punishing power but his more recent encounter with Bill Brennan at Madison Square Garden did not demonstrate that he still retains the forceful punch necessary to successfully stand off a man of Carpenter's undoubted ability and cleverness. Just how good the challenger is or how hard a blow he can land is problematical to the most of fistic patrons who have seen him in action. His only bout in America, that with Levinsky, always a clever boxer, made practically no serious effort to defend himself and went down an easy victim to the Frenchman in the fourth round.

Nearly thirty years have elapsed since Queensberry rules and glove contests were substituted for the London prize ring code governing pugilistic contests for championship titles. In most of the bouts fought for the heavyweight championship since the change took place, there was a decided advantage in stature between the principals, but this did not always carry victory with it.

## Ten Years Ago in Prince Rupert

Hon. William Temperton, the popular member for Comox, attended a heart to heart talk with his supporters about the needs of the district, at a crowded meeting last night at the McIntyre Hall.

There arrived in the G.T.P. party that reached the city yesterday, President Hays, E. J. Chamberlain, Vice President and General manager; Mr. Dalrymple, general traffic manager; Capt. C. H. Nicholson; W. G. Donnelly, expert on dry docks; and Mr. D'Arcy Tate. Mr. Hays and Mr. Chamberlain are accompanied by their secretaries and Capt. Gibson, vice president of the G.T.P. Dock Co.

The city council and the railway company have come to an agreement on the assessment matter. The city agrees to forfeit its claim for \$106,000 taxes for last year, and accept \$15,000 a year for ten years instead. The company will hand over the Park site and 100 feet of water frontage at Fairview.

## THE RED CROSS AND ITS WORK AMONG THE CHILDREN

WITH the Red Cross Public Health Movement now being conducted by the Society in all Canada, and particularly with the British Columbia Division, it is aimed to strike at the root of all evils, the commencement of which is, quite naturally, more often found to take place among the children. One of the commonest causes leading to disease, malnutrition and consequent backwardness of development in children, is defective teeth. The crusade against bad teeth among school children is of course getting all the attention possible in the cities by periodical examination of school children's teeth, but this movement has but in few cases extended to the rural districts. It is the aim of the Red Cross, in connection with its Public Health Movement in British Columbia, to establish a dental clinic to promote the work of education in Oral Hygiene among school teachers, parents, and actually take care of and treat the teeth of school children in the outlying portions of this province.

A MOVEMENT similar to this has already been taken up by the Red Cross in Nova Scotia. In the summer of 1920, the Nova Scotia Red Cross Society organized and equipped paid for and operated two distinct and separate clinics which toured the province for forty-eight days. This touring clinic embraced and undertook a great deal more than actual dental work among the children. It included one specialist in the diseases of the chest; one specialist in diseases of the eye, ear, nose and throat; one dentist, and two specially trained public health nurses. It is not expected that such a complete organization can be organized and equipped in the very near future in British Columbia, but it is the aim of the Society to organize and equip at the earliest possible moment a travelling clinic which will combine at least one specialist in the diseases of eye, ear, nose and throat; one dentist, and one trained public health nurse.
