HAZELTON, Nov. 26.—The fine new schoolhouse at Kitzeukla, Skeena Crossing, built by the Department of Indian Affairs for the Indian children in that village, was opened and dedicated last Sunday by Rev. J. H. Young of Terrace, superintendent of Methodist missions in the Skeena Valley. The new building is a handsome structure and one that will be appreciated by all the Indians. Mr. and Mrs. Orchard are the teachers.

MRS. PECK SHOWN ON ADVISORY COMMITTEE CONSERVATIVE MEMBER

In advertising a big joint mass meeting of the three Conservative candidates for Vancouver centre, Burrard and South Vancouver the names of the members of the advisory committee of each are published in the Vancouver Province. Included among the names of H. H. Stevens' committee is that of a former resident of this city and now living in Vancouver, Mrs. C. W. Peck.

Mr. Stevens is minister of Trade and Commerce in the Meighen Government and not an independent.

BET IS PLACED ON STORK MAJORITY IN COMING ELECTION

A bet of fifty dollars that Stork will get a majority of 300 has been accepted by a local Conservative. So far as can be heard there is no even money changing hands. There is plenty offering on the Stork side. Any visitor to the Liberal committee rooms between 8 and 9 o'clock in the evening can, it is said, get all the money he wants on a fifty-fifty basis.

It is now conceded that Stork will have a good majority in Prince Rupert. Just how large it will be is not very clear, but some enthusiasts go so far as to say it will be at least two to one.

Supporters of Colonel Peck are making strenuous efforts on his behalf and are leaving nothing to chance in their efforts to turn the tide.

TO BUILD HOUSES IN EDMONTON CITY

EDMONTON, Nov. 26.—Edmonton has a building scheme fathered by Count de Toper. It is proposed to erect two million dollars worth of houses in the city, the lots to be purchased from the city at the upset prices and to be free of taxes until sold or occupied. This proposal is meeting with favor and it is expected work will be commenced in the spring.
