## SENIOR LEAGUE BASKETBALL WILL CARRY ON LAST NIGHT

Decided at Special Meeting to Run League Series with Two Teams Playing.

At the special meeting of the Basketball Association executive and players held last evening in the Sons of Canada rooms following the games at the Exhibition Hall, it was decided, after much discussion, to continue the Senior League series with the two teams, the Sons of Canada and the Elks. One game will be played one week and two the next and there will be sixteen or eighteen games in the course of the winter.

The possibility of dividing the league into three teams was discussed from every angle but it was found impossible to effect this. The Sons of Canada delegates, while admitting that they had a number of extra players now, stated that they were not prepared to release any of them for it was expected that several would be leaving for the south before the season was over. The Elks stated that they did not have a large line-up and, in fact, had hardly been able to muster a team for last night's game. The idea of mustering a third team outside the ranks of the present players was not considered seriously. The Intermediate League representatives did not feel inclined to release any players for the Senior. In the first place, they might not be able to keep up the Senior pace and, secondly, there would be a danger of breaking up the Intermediate League if any of the players went over to the Senior.

It has been decided that neither of the two Senior League games already played will be counted in the league standing. W. E. Willisroff was in the chair at the meeting last night and there was a good attendance of players and directors of the league.

## WEIRD STORY FROM OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Nov. 26.—G. G. McNeill, secretary of the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans, has addressed an open telegram to Premier Meighen, T. A. Crerar, Sir Lomer Gouin and the presidents of the Bank of Montreal and of the Canadian Pacific Railway demanding if there is any truth in the story given the veterans by a non-partisan authority that a conspiracy is afoot to form a coalition after the election between the Quebec Liberals and certain party interests and the big financial interests, with Sir Lomer Gouin as Premier.

The purpose of the coalition is supposed to be the return of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway to its original directors and the "looting" of the national roads to a point where the transfer to private corporation control will be welcomed by the taxpayers.

The veterans say they understand that both Meighen and King were to be displaced as party leaders to permit unhampered action by the moneyed interests. The confusion of the public mind on election issues will prevent the possibility of a party majority in the election and the corruption of the key men in the Progressives is undermining confidence in Crerar, it is also charged.
