#### EMPHATIC PROTEST.

Editor Daily News:  
Without political bias, and with no reference whatever to the local political situation, as a member of this community and a fair-minded citizen of Canada I wish to voice an emphatic protest against the appearance in the public press of such sentiments as appeared last night in the editorial column of the Evening Empire, wherein the honored name of Belgium was dragged into the local controversy in a manner which, to make the most charitable allowances, was an exhibition of extremely bad taste.
