Is Opposed to Party System.

A correspondent from Anyox is opposed to the party system of government. The other method is for the administration to be independent of a party vote, just as it is in the United States, and for each member of the House to treat every question wholly on its merits and vote accordingly.

In our country the administration adopts a policy, asks the approval of the country at an election and then sets out to put that policy in force. As long as the members of the legislature approve its actions, it is kept in power. If the members of the legislature disapprove, the administration resigns and gives place to another.

Dealing With Foreign Countries.

One notable example of how this works in regard to a foreign policy is well exemplified. The United States makes a treaty with Canada providing for the protection of the salmon in the Fraser River. Both the U.S. and the Canadian administrations agree to it. But there is the U.S. Senate to be reckoned with.

In Canada, the Government knows that it can control Parliament as long as it has a reasonable policy. By consulting with the leaders it is able to practically promise the passing of the treaty. Because of the inability of the United States to act the Fraser River fishing has been ruined and the remedy is not yet in sight.

Farmer Party Is Political.

Our correspondent speaks as though the Farmers' party of Ontario was not a party. In that it is evident he is mistaken. Premier Drury is at the head of a political party just as much as is John Oliver or Arthur Meighen.

Liberal and Conservative Old.

The Liberal and the Conservative parties are old parties and in a general sense they have particular lines of policy. Speaking in a very general way, the policy of the Conservatives is to go slowly and steadily, to look backward for precedents and to carefully avoid anything which smacks of radicalism.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

JURYWOMEN DISCUSSED

Counsel Objects to Laying Unsavory Evidence before Women Jurors

BERNARD SHAW IS OUT IN DEFENCE

LONDON, Mar. 2.—A storm of discussion, both commendation and condemnation, has swept through London newspapers as the result of the innovation of having women serve with men as members of juries in divorce cases.

The first mixed jury to sit in the London divorce court has been unable to agree on a verdict and has been discharged after hearing the case for four days.

In the comment on the proceedings, newspaper editorials and the contributed communications of readers have discussed principally the propriety of obliging women as members of the jury to examine all the evidence submitted.

Evidence Unsavory

In this case counsel for one of the parties to the action announced that he had evidence to submit which he did not consider it proper to place before women jurors. The judge said he was helpless in the matter, but ultimately only the men jurors examined the evidence.

Sir Edward Marshall-Hall, counsel for one of the parties, said that this was the first case he had ever conducted before a mixed jury and that he hoped he would never again have to deal with a case of such a nature again.

"It is undeniable that there are many cases in which the assistance of women will be of the greatest value to the court," said Sir Edward, "but there are other cases in which, from the nature of the evidence which will have to be discussed before them, it is undesirable that they should serve."

Extremely Offensive

Sir Edward's comment evoked a hot retort from George Bernard Shaw, playwright, who, writing to the Daily News as "a member of the male sex," took issue with the views of the barrister.

"Sir Edward Marshall-Hall's assumption that my sensibilities in this matter are less delicate than women is not only unfounded but extremely offensive," wrote Mr. Shaw. "Why in the name of common sense did this blushing barrister exclude six jurymen from the apology which he thought it necessary to make for presenting them (some of the exhibits in the case) to the six jurymen."

SHIPPING FISH

WINNIPEG, Mar. 2.—Fish in storage at Riverton is rapidly being disposed of and dealers anticipate no further trouble at that point.

Within the past week 14 cars of fish have been shipped from Riverton to the United States, bringing the total shipments of this year's catch to 225 carloads; each car contains 15 tons of tullhee and pickerel. The balance of the catch in storage, 25 cars or 750,000 pounds, will be shipped as soon as cars are available, probably within the next three days, dealers interviewed today on the situation stated.
