City Building Down This Year

Permits For August Totalled \$2,450, Bringing Aggregate For Year Up to \$48,220

Building permits issued in the city of Prince Rupert during the month of August this year amounted to only \$2450 as compared with \$16,000 in the same month last year. So far this year building in the city has represented a total value of \$48,220 as against \$140,328 in the first eight months of 1931.
