gram to Ochiishi indicated that ". Kakumabetsu, where only an occasional fisherman puts in during the crossest of the control of the summer, was deserted except for himself and his companions.

Tonight von Gronau was gathering weather data by radio to determine whether he should start tomorrow on the 800-mile flight to Nemuro over the fog-shrouded Kurile Islands. Airmen consider this the most difficult part of the Pacific Ocean crossing.

Germany Insists Upon Having Parity of Arms With Allied Powers

BERLIN, Sept. 2 - Germany issued a demand yesterday for transmission to France, Great Britain and other Allied powers insisting upon equality of arms with Allied powers either by the others disarming or Germany being allowed to increase her armaments.

Political observers here declare that such a move on the part of Germany would be a deliberate breach of the Treaty of Versailles.
