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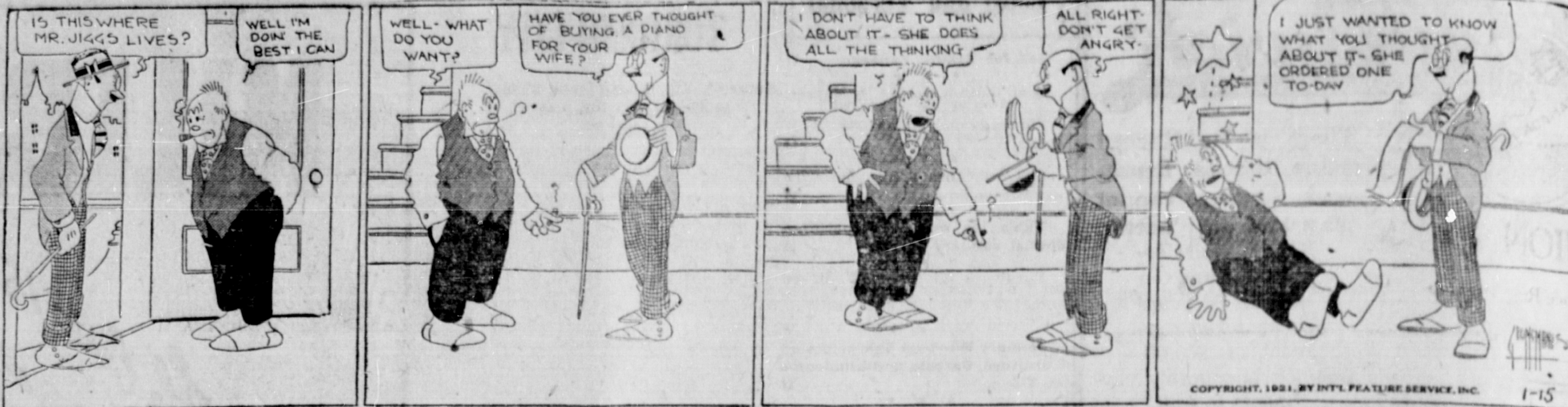

HANGED HIMSELF TO HIS BEDPOST

N. Shewchuk Committed Suicide in Hotel at Edson

By taking a leather strap which he tied around the top of the bed post and inserting his head in a noose made at the other, N. Shewchuk committed suicide in the Edson hotel and a coroner's jury which later investigated the case came to the conclusion that the man committed the act while of an unsound mind. According to Constable Caldwell's report which has just reached headquarters of the Alberta Provincial police, the deceased was found in a sitting posture on the floor at the foot of the bed. He was leaning back on a strap which he had tied to one end of the bed and around his neck.

Artificial respiration was tried immediately the man was found, but although this was carried on for twenty minutes both by Police Constable Caldwell and Dr. Proctor, it was without avail. Deceased entered Edson from the Thorhild neighborhood and had been in poor health for a considerable time. Addresses which he left on the table of his room proved that the act was premeditated.

ALBERTA GOVERNMENT SELLS BONDS WELL

Gets 96 for Six per cent Securities Running Fifteen Years

EDMONTON, Jan. 22.—Tenders for the two million dollar bond issue for the Province of Alberta were opened at noon Monday in the Parliament Buildings by the provincial treasurer, Hon. C. R. Mitchell, and after consideration as to the differences in Canadian and American payments, the tender of the Wood, Gundy Co., of Toronto at 96.21 in Canadian currency was finally accepted. Immediately on the announcement of the decision, several of the bond houses present congratulated the minister on the splendid price he had received. The issue for Canadian payment was for a fifteen year period, the American payment being for ten years, and the interest at 6 per cent. Associated with Wood, Gundy in this purchase are A. E. Ames & Co. and Aemilia Jarvis & Co., all of Toronto. In American payment the same firm put in a bid at 99.29.
