HERRING CHASED BY SEA LIONS MORSE CREEK BRIDGE WORK

Driven Ashore on Prince of Wales Island in Countless Numbers

Bents are Now Up from Both Ends—Should be Finished April 11

Chased up on the beach by a great herd of sea lions, thousands of herring were beached on the shore of the Inlet at Klawak on the west coast of Prince of Wales Island recently, according to members of the crew of the Lighthouse tender Fern, which stopped there.

"They shone like a great live silver horde," says First Officer Charles H. Nerup, "and in places were several inches deep." The sea lions were so plentiful in the bay that none dared venture across in a small boat.

Millions of herring spawn in the vicinity of Klawak each year, especially on Fish Egg Island, where natives from Craig and Klawak have for years gathered eggs and dried them for food.

There were so many herring in the inlet last Thursday that when the sea lions appeared they simply crowded each other up on the beach, where they were left by the receding tide.

Thirty-nine Cases in February Police Court Brought 35 Convictions.

Thirty-nine cases were tried in the city police court in February, according to the monthly report of Chief of Police W. H. Vickers. Convictions numbered thirty-five and the total of fines was \$973.50. Offences were as follows: Insanity 1; theft, 1; opium and drug cases, 5; prohibition act, 2; obtaining goods under false pretences, 1; theft from person, 4, and the usual quota of drunkenness.
