## Interest Taken in West Peterboro Election.

Great interest is being taken throughout the Dominion in the election campaign in West Peterboro. The constituency has been visited by the leaders of all the prominent parties and the issue is being carefully watched.

When addressing the electors at Peterboro recently MacKenzie King objected to the issue being made one of protection vs. free trade. He said that no matter which way that went, there would be protection until a general appeal was made to the country. The issue was one of whether the people rule or not. There was no longer a Union Government. Now Union cabinet had resigned when Mr. Borden left office. Now there was a National Liberal and Conservative Government with Premier Meighen at its head. Under the circumstances the people of Canada had a constitutional right to an election. The people would then have a right to voice an opinion on the tariff.

## Burnham Runs As Conservative.

Mr. Burnham, a Conservative, who was elected as a Unionist at the last general election, resigned because he considered the present Government was no longer Unionist and appealed to the people of his constituency for re-election as a Conservative. He would not pledge himself to vote against the Government if returned, so the Liberals are running a candidate against him. There is also a Government candidate in the field, a farmer and a labor representative. It looks like a British Columbia free for all. Because of the multiplicity of candidates, the result will not mean much, unless the result goes against the Government. Then it will be an indication that there is but a very small minority of the people of that constituency favoring a continuance of the present administration.

## Wonder Is Everyone Was so Patient.

Since the people of this city began to express themselves so very emphatically in regard to the lack of fish cars, the opinion is very generally expressed that the wonder was people stood it so long. It is years since there has been sufficient cars to handle the business. As a matter of fact there never has been sufficient, even with borrowings from the United States. Since the U.S. roads have refused to lend their cars in any numbers for this purpose, the shortage has been more marked than previously.

With the advent of the Government as owners or controllers of the line, we were told everything would be lovely. We should get many things we were unable to get before. Instead of a better condition, we have a worse. If we can get fish cars, a station, a round house and suitable extension of the yards in addition to coal bunkers, we shall feel like welcoming the Government ownership of the road. The immediate need, however, is fish cars, and these we expect to get soon.

## Real Race to be Held Very Soon.

There is to be a real yacht race in the near future, if the sportsmen of the countries interested will only take the matter up and enter boats. The King of Belgium has offered a prize for a race from Sandy Hook to Ostend. This will be no fine weather race. A boat will have to be a real sailing craft and not a toy in order to enter. An international event of that kind would be something to talk about.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 6 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

## VISCOUNT GREY AND TREATIES

Urge Keeping League of Nations  
to Prevent War in Future

When having conferred with the freedom of the city of Glasgow Viscount Grey spoke of present world politics. He said in part:

"What I do feel about this country is that the general sense of the community will show that, as has often been the case before when other nations had been driven to extreme courses, there has been an element of stability and solid sense in this country which has sought for remedies, not by sudden violence, but by steady and peaceful reform. But I do feel that it is essential that there should not be another war, and if there is not to be another war we must see that in Europe there does not grow up again the state of things that there was before the war. (Cheers.)

## No Secret Treaties

Proceeding, Lord Grey said that he agreed with those who said there should be no secret treaties. He had made some, but that was in time of war when they were inevitable. Mentioning incidentally the military conversations with France, he pointed out the stipulation on our part that these conversations were not to commit either country. The state of Europe before the war was one of alliance and counter-alliance and competition in armaments.

"I am as strong as anybody could be," Lord Grey continued, "that we ought to maintain the closest possible relations with our late Allies, especially with France and Italy. I say nothing about the United States for the moment, because the United States is waiting for a declaration of policy from its newly-elected President. Until that policy is declared I think any attempt to anticipate what the United States may take, and still more any attempt to influence that line, would be perfectly futile and probably mischievous.

## Armament Competition

"The Triple Alliance made by Germany after 1870 brought into existence the Franco-Russian alliance, which led to competition in armaments. If we let things take the same course again in spite of the warnings of this war, we shall have the same result.

It is absolutely necessary to keep some Council of the Nations together. Keep them in touch; keep your relations with your Allies, but watch for any tendency to this growth of competition in armaments and when any nation is beginning to force the pace in the competition of armaments then let the Council of Nations prevent that competition growing up as before the war.

## League of Nations

To do that you must have something which keeps nations in touch and keeps them together. Some people say that in a League of Nations there will not be any certainty.

There will not be a certainty, but I am quite convinced if you have another war 20 years hence it will, in a sense, be like this war, but it will be infinitely worse and there will be a certainty that it will destroy the civilization of Europe.

If you tell me the League of Nations is Utopia the answer I give is: I prefer the chance of Utopia to the certainty of destruction."
