NEW THEATRE IS PLANNED

Prince Rupert Amusement Announces Plans for Biggest Showhouse in City

WILL ALSO CONTAIN STORES AND OFFICES

Before the departure of Mitchell Albert for the south yesterday afternoon, the Prince Rupert Amusement Co., of which he is a director, announced their intention of erecting on Third Avenue a new and large theatre in a central location. The proposed building will of three stories and will contain besides the theatre, with a capacity of from 1000 to 1200 persons, accommodation for stores and offices.

The building will be built of reinforced concrete and will be of fireproof construction. The theatre will be on the main floor on the street level and the interior will be finished in marble and tile. The stage will be the largest one in the city and will be thoroughly equipped for the production of both legitimate performances and motion pictures.
