 NEW YORK, July 7.—The statement of Dempsey regarding the appearance of two men in the ring surprised newspapermen who covered the bout and who did not notice mysterious visitors in the ring. They say that to reach the ringside men would have to pass away down an aisle which was heavily guarded by police or climb over several rows of workers, typewriters and telegraph instruments.

There is no doubt that Georges Carpentier was one of the most heavily over-rated boxers who ever contended for the World's heavyweight championship. Looking over last Saturday's fight with Dempsey and the events leading up to it at the Garpentier camp at Manhasset, some boxing critics now advance the theory that the Frenchman's camp was kept so private for the reason that Deschamps and other of Carpentier's supporters realized the small show their man stood of defeating Dempsey and did not want to hurt the gate receipts and the enthusiasm for the fight by letting the public generally know of the contender's weakness. Some people think that Joe Jeanette let the secret out on Wall Street and betting was thus enhanced on Dempsey's chances.

The next big boxing bout that will draw the general attention of fans of the fistie, art will be the fight for the middleweight championship between Wilson and Mike Gibbons. Both of these men will have many supporters and Wilson has a good chance of winning for he is learning fast and is all the time keeping in the best of condition. Many think he will be able to defeat Mike Gibbons as easily as he did Jack Britton.

The tennis game seems to have worked up a great deal more public enthusiasm at Anxoy than it has done here according to the local players who were at the smelter town last week to participate in the Dominion Day tournament. There are several interesting ladder competitions in progress there and the rivalry is keen among the many entrants. Tennis at Anxoy is one of the most talked of lines of sport while here the hardy ever bears it mentioned. Both ladies and gentlemen take a great interest in it and there are many players. It was probably due to the fact that the Anxoy players have had so much more practice that they outclassed the locals last week.
