WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Salmon Pack Well Up to Last Year—Former Local Officer Now Fish Packing—Halibut Landings

The salmon pack on the Skeena River for the 1932 season up to August 20 had reached a total of 170,619 cases as compared with 164,282 cases at a similar date last year. The sockeye pack for this year was little more than half of that for last season, the spring pack was three times last year, cohoes about double, pink pack slightly more than last year with chums much heavier.

The Naas River pack this year was 77,441 cases in comparison with last year's 14,674 cases at a similar date last season. The Rivers Inlet pack this year is slightly down while the Smith's Inlet output is about double of that of last year. The pack for the central area shows a large increase over last year. For the whole British Columbia coast up to August 20 the pack was 685,690 cases as against 497,245 cases up to the corresponding date last year.

Halibut landings for the 1932 season at the port of Prince Rupert up to and including yesterday totalled 10,551,350 pounds of which 7,250,100 pounds had been brought in by American vessels and 3,301,250 pounds by Canadian boats. During the week ending yesterday landings totalled 457,800 pounds of which 98,000 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 359,800 pounds from American. Prices during the week were at rather a low ebb. For Canadian vessels the high price of the week was 6.8c and 3c which the Ingrid H. received for 14,000 pounds and the low 4.5c and 3c which was paid the Capella and White Hope for catches of 9,000 and 14,000 pounds respectively. For American fish the top bid of the week was 5.7c and 2c paid the Fremont and Wabash for catches of 16,000 and 6,000 pounds respectively and the low 3c and 2c received by the Radio and Thor for catches of 44,000 and 30,000 pounds respectively.

Sam Grady, who will be remembered by pioneers here as a member of the city police force in the early days, returned to Vancouver recently after spending the summer engaged in fish packing in the Rivers Inlet district. Mr. Grady has been engaged in salmon fishing and packing for years and has spent several seasons on the Queen Charlotte Islands.

PICTURE THRILLS

Adventure and Romance Combined in "The Broken Wing" Coming at First of Week
