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THOUSANDS SOLDIERS ROUNDING UP DISTURBERS

STATEMENTS OF PRIVATE STOCKS ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE DEMANDED

British Coal Miners Rejected Owners' Offer of Settlement In General Vote Just Taken

LONDON, June 17.—The ballot of the coal miners on the question of a settlement of the strike, which has now been on for nearly three months, favors a continuance of the coal strike, according to an official announcement of the result that was made this afternoon. The vote stood 183,827 for acceptance of the mine owners' terms and 432,511 for rejection. The announcement of the result has cast still further gloom over the industrial interests of Great Britain. The country is now about to face times, with the continuation of the strike, that will be unprecedented in history. The owners had been confidently expecting a favorable response to their terms and an early resumption of work.

B. C. SALMON GIFT WAS GOOD

British Minister of Health Denies That War Shipment Was Defective.

LONDON, June 17.—Sir Alfred Mond, British minister of health, today informed the House of Commons that the charge of a gift shipment of British Columbia salmon being defective was untrue. The minister stated that the salmon had been inspected and found excellent and no complaints had been received from any participants in the eating of the fish.

REFUSES TO JOIN MOVEMENT FOR EUROPE UNION

American Federation Convention Also Refuses to Endorse O. B. U.

DENVER, June 17.—The American Federation of Labor has renewed its repudiation of the International Federation of Labor and has also refused the request from Amsterdam that it reconsider its refusal to affiliate with the European unionism movement. A resolution endorsing the One Big Union was also defeated at the convention today.

MANY MURDERS IN LAST YEAR

Secretary For Ireland Reports 568 Due to Activities of Rebels.

LONDON, June 17.—The number of murders in Ireland since July, 1920, due to the activities of the rebels totals 568 according to a statement made in the House of Commons yesterday by Sir Hamar Greenwood, Secretary for Ireland. Only two members of the Crown Forces were found guilty of murders. One other charged with murder had been found insane.

POSTPONEMENT CONFERENCE ON NAVAL DEFENCE

Premier Meighen Wants It and Premiers Hughes and Massey Are Against.

LONDON, June 17.—Premier Meighen of Canada is expected to have the support of Hon. Lloyd George in asking that the conference for discussion of naval defence affairs be postponed until after a constitutional conference can be held. Premier Hughes of Australia and Premier Massey of New Zealand, are opposing the suggestion.

HUSBAND HELD CHARGE MURDER

Inquest Brings Suicide Pact to Light—Result of Midnight Fire.

CALGARY, June 17.—J. J. Rutledge has been charged with murder as a result of a coroner's jury finding him responsible for the death of his wife and three children who were burned to death when a midnight fire destroyed their farm home near Innisfail the night before last. Rutledge confessed that he and his wife had formed a suicide pact because of immoral conditions in the home. After the house had started to burn, however, he had lost his nerve and had escaped with one of his four children. Mrs. Rutledge's sister, who also escaped from the fire, is being held as a material witness.

PACIFIC ROUTE TO FORT NORMAN

First Musters Who Went in That Way Arrive at Edmonton to File Leases.

EDMONTON, June 17.—J. Macdonnell and H. M. McKenna, two members of the party who made an overland dash to Fort Norman from Vancouver and by way of Skagway, Whitehorse and Garmack's Post, reached here to file their leases in the northern oil fields this week. They are the first men to file Fort Norman leases here who went in by the Pacific route.

JAPAN LEAVING SIBERIA SOON

Preparing to Evacuate Northern Russia at Once.

RIGA, June 17.—A despatch from Moscow says that Japan has decided to evacuate Siberia immediately and preparations are being made to that end. Announcement that Japan would leave Siberia was made some time ago.

INSURGENT ARMY TURNS BOLSHEVIK

Members of Korfanty's Troops Forming Red Army—Fostered by Communists.

BERLIN, June 17.—Bolshevism has broken out in the ranks of Korfanty's insurgent army in upper Silesia and red flags have been hoisted. Some of the deserting officers have formed a Red Army for the purpose of levying money. It is believed that this rebellion has been fostered by Austrian, French and German communists.

CHURCH SYNOD IN FAVOR BEER

Anglicans in Kootenay Diocese Endorse Serving it and Light Wines on Tables.

NELSON, June 17.—The Kootenay Anglican Synod has formally endorsed the views of Bishop Doull favoring the serving of beer and light wines on hotel tables. The diocese has forbidden the clergy to marry divorced persons while their former mates are still alive.

Pillage and Destruction is Still Continuing in Heart Of Ireland's Capital City

DUBLIN, June 17.—Disturbances with murder and rapine are becoming more numerous in Ireland and they are increasing in the magnitude of destruction and pillage. The warfare has again broken out in the heart of Dublin city.

The Carnegie Library on Castle Island has been burned and a mail train was robbed of one hundred sacks. One man was killed and another wounded for giving evidence in court proceedings. Two men were sentenced to ten and fifteen years' imprisonment for having ammunition in their possession. The government forces are making a cleanup and hundreds of suspects have been arrested but only a dozen have been held.

Expanding bombs on the streets of Dublin after the ringing of the curfew terrified the citizens last night. There are no known casualties.

Troops Fording Up. Five thousand troops are said to be engaged in a roundup in South Managhan and the Gavin districts but the police profess ignorance of the move.

The large number of disturbances now going on are generally accredited to the efforts that the revolutionaries are making to prevent the visit of the King here next week to open the Ulster parliament. It is thought quite possible now that they may be successful in their efforts in this regard and the proposed visit of the King may have to be called off.

GOVERNMENT ENGINEERS ON INSPECTION TRIP

P. Phillip, provincial engineer and T. Kilpatrick, government bridge inspector, who arrived in the city last Wednesday, are at present in Alice Arm in the course of an annual tour of inspection of government works in the province. Going from Alice Arm they will visit Anyox and Stewart, returning to Prince Rupert on Sunday night next. They will then go East as far as Prince George stopping off at several places intervening, amongst which will be Terrace and Usk. A visit will most likely be made to Lakelse Lake and the Dominion government Hatcheries.

LORD CURZON IS IN PARIS

To Confer with Premier Briand on Problems Facing Britain and France.

PARIS, June 17.—Lord Curzon, the British secretary of state and foreign affairs, has reached here to confer with Premier Briand on problems that are now facing France and Britain in common. Great interest is attached to Lord Curzon's visit in view of the reports that the British premier has decided to confine his whole attention to home politics leaving foreign affairs to Lord Curzon.

IRISHMEN ARE CUTTING WIRES

Occasioning Damage to Wires and Signalmen—Nine Men Arrested.

LONDON, June 17.—A widespread campaign of cutting railway and signal wires and burning of signal cabins around London attended by violence against the signalmen is being carried out by Sinn Feiners and members of the Irish Self Determination League. Nine men, all Irish, have been arrested.

LOYD GEORGE MAN WAS DEFEATED AT BY-ELECTION TODAY

LONDON, June 17.—The Lloyd George candidate was defeated in the Hereford by-election when Read-Admiral Seuter, running on the Anti-Waste platform, was elected for the seat made vacant by the resignation of Pemberton Billings. Seuter (Independent) had 42,329 votes and Carlisle (Coalition Unionist) 5,553.

DRUNKS WILL PAY BIG FINE HEREAFTER

Vancouver Decides on \$50 for the First Offence—Must Tell Where Obtained.

VANCOUVER, June 17.—Hereafter fifty dollar fines will be imposed for drunks in the Vancouver police court and they will also be required to show where liquor was obtained. In the past a \$10 fine has been mechanically imposed for the offence of drunkenness.

THOUSANDS DIE IN KIEV OF STARVATION

Dire Famine Conditions Exist in City Under Siege by Ukrainians.

BERNE, Switzerland, June 17.—Dire famine conditions are reported from Kiev which is now under siege by the Ukrainian insurgents. Two thousand people are said to have died in one day from starvation.

Must Make Account Liquor Not Bought Under Control Act

VICTORIA, June 17.—All persons in British Columbia in possession of liquor not purchased from the government must send a statement of its quantity and kind to the Liquor Control Board before July 15, according to an announcement which was made by Liquor Commissioner W. N. Winsby here yesterday. Failure to do so will mean confiscation.

On report being made by the owners, labels will be sent to them which they will be required to affix to their stocks. There will be no house to house census of the liquor supplies by the board but the accounting will be strictly voluntary.

Commissioner Winsby stated that the operation of the act was being menaced by the attitude certain individuals and companies were maintaining as to their rights to import liquor.

JACK JOHNSON IS OFFERED BIG SUM TO BATTLE AGAIN

LEAVENWORTH, June 17.—Jack Johnson, former heavyweight boxing champion of the world, has been offered \$55,000 to meet Harry Wills at Jersey City on August 9. Johnson is serving time in the Federal penitentiary for violation of the Mann Act. He will be released from prison on July 7.

NOVA SCOTIANS BEST MARKSMEN

Won Dominion Marksmanship Championship Today at Halifax

HALIFAX, June 17.—The Gloucester Academy, of Truro, Nova Scotia, won the 1921 Dominion marksmanship championship today with a score of 1379, defeating the best school shots in Canada. Calgary was second with a score of 1367.
