Its depth is 16 feet and it is located on the west side of the channel about 5100 feet from Donville Point. Its latitude is N. 50d, 31 h, 45 m, and longitude W. 126 d, 18 h, 25 m.

A. Dixon, master of the Gammon, reports that the depth of the uncharted rock in Laredo Channel, about half way between Schooner Point and the South Channel Islands, is 14 feet and not 21 feet as previously reported. Its location is: Latitude, 52 d, 39 h, 55 m; longitude, W. 128 d, 57 h, 00 m.

ANTI-CIGARETTE LAW EFFECTIVE IN UTAH

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 17.—Utah's anti-cigarette law, passed by the last Legislature, became effective this week. Simultaneously the shelves of tobacco stores were cleared of cigarettes and there were no advertisements in the newspapers of cigarettes. The law provides against smoking in public places, which are defined, and prohibits the giving away, sale, exchange or barter of cigarettes.

Mass Meeting This Week Disapproves of Board's Action—Ask that It Be Reversed.

PRINCE GEORGE, June 17.—Hospital matters are the topic of general discussion around this city at the present time. Recently the hospital board decided to reduce the staff of the hospital from four to three nurses and one nurse, Miss Gagne, was let out. On account of charges of extravagance that were made by members of the board, the matron, Miss Gray, resigned.

The action of the board resulted in a mass meeting of representative citizens which was held at the first of the week in the Rills-Kifer Hall. Two hundred were in attendance and a resolution was passed, disapproving of the board's action in reducing the staff and asking that the service of Miss Gray and Miss Gagne be retained.

ITALY LOST FROM STRIKES

Largest Number of Strikes During 1920 in History.

ROME, June 16.—Italy lost 55,000,000 days of work last year because of strikes, according to figures just published by the Ministry of Labor. This figure includes labor disorders of every kind—wage disputes, loss occasioned by the occupation of the factories by workmen from last July to September and disorders in the farming districts.

Wage disputes caused the major part of the loss, with 16,500,000 days. The Communist agitations of last year when the factories were occupied are calculated to have resulted in 10,000,000 lost days. Political strikes and other suspensions not included in the other classes are said to have lost 15,500,000 days.

The textile workers engaged in 212 strikes, the largest number in any trade, throwing out of work nearly 150,000 workmen. The most costly dispute was that of the transportation workers who had 137 strikes, affecting 241,359 workmen and losing 2,523,057 days of work.
