YOUNG MAN DROWNS AS PEOPLE WATCH

EDMONTON, July 8.—Within full view of many picnickers who were celebrating on the shore, Volo C. Wilson, aged 25 years, was drowned in a lake in the Vermilion neighborhood. The deceased was bathing at the time and his brother and another man were also in the water at the time and were unable to render assistance.

According to reports received at local headquarters of the Alberta Provincial Police, the body of deceased was not recovered until the next day when it was found in about six feet of water. Wilson was in poor health and was a poor swimmer at the time of his death.

LIGHTNING STRUCK AND KILLED A MAN IN WINNIPEG DISTRICT

WINNIPEG, July 8.—A man was instantly killed by lightning Friday evening in the vicinity of Deacon, on the Greater Winnipeg Water District line.

The dead man was driving with a farmer named Kopolson, a resident of the district, between 6 and 7 o'clock, when the rig in which they were riding was struck by a bolt of lightning and one occupant killed. Kopolson narrowly escaping a similar fate. The body of the dead man was left lying on the prairie all night pending instructions from Provincial Coroner R. J. McDonnell, who could not get a telephone message owing to a break in the line.

YOUNG MEN SENT TO JAIL FOR STEALING

Elder Brother Pleads for Younger Before Sentence is Passed.

EDMONTON, July 8.—When the Wysk brothers who have been convicted on several charges of breaking and entry and theft appeared for sentence before Judge Taylor in the district court, William, the elder brother, stood up and said that he was willing to take all the blame and all the punishment in order that the young brother, August, who he said was led astray, might go free and be given a chance to assert his manhood in life.

His honor in passing sentence took into consideration the ages of the two accused, and had respect to the plea of the older man and sentenced William, aged 25 to seven years imprisonment in the penitentiary, and August, aged 19, to two years less one month in Fort Saskatchewan jail.
