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Quarter Million Aerial Tram Line Tenders Will Be Invited Tomorrow for New Government Buildings

Contract Is Let for Aerial Tramline at Premier Mine To Cost Quarter Million

contract for the construction of the aerial tram line from the Premier mine to tide water at Stewart has been let to the Tramway Co. of Spokane, Washington. It is eleven and a half miles long with a 1,400-foot drop and is one of the longest in the continent. The distance by road from the mine shaft is fourteen and a half miles but the tramway takes a direct route.

Surveys for the new tramline are already almost complete and tenders are being called for the clearing of the right of way. This is to be let in lengths and thirty days is allowed for the completion of that part of the work.

Only the right of way is the remainder of the work to be done and it is hoped to have material on the ground before the break up, which will enable the tramline to bring ore at Stewart by the middle of the summer.

New Ore Bunkers.

Bunkers are to be constructed adjoining the present government wharf at Hyder and automatic unloading will be used which will enable the ore to be handled in bulk.

There are to be single stations on the line, Nine-Mile, one at Fish Creek and a third at Hyder not on the dock. At each of these stations the ore will be handled over three hours in 24 hours and as a result of the better facilities for ore, lower grade ore will be shipped than at present.

Progress is being made by company with the new equipment which will have a capacity of 125 tons a day and be ready for operation by June. By the very latest process the lower grade ore will be treated and all the extracted. This mill has modern improvements in science for the treating such as those found at the mine. The usual cyanide process will be used and tails will then be treated by the cyanide process, so that nothing of any value remains when it reaches the

TENDERS FOR COURT HOUSE

MEXICO HAS BIG DROUGHT

Unless Rain Comes Middle of Next Month No Water in Country

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 21.—This city has been suffering for weeks from a shortage of water and light owing to an unusually long dry season. Water and street lights have been rationed, electric advertisements prohibited and an immense quantity of high grade ore has been shipped, an electric light plant installed with water power and gasoline auxiliary.

The newspapers say the city is facing the most severe dry season in its history and that unless heavy rains come its water supply will be exhausted by the middle of April.

RAILWAY COMMISSION GIVES JUDGMENT ON PRINCE GEORGE SHIP

Will Hear Western Freight Rate Argued in Vancouver and Victoria.

OTTAWA, March 21.—The Board of Railway Commissioners have issued a judgment in regard to the Prince George station on the G.T.P.R. line. By this judgment it is to be located between Dominion and Quebec streets. This in a measure reverses the former decision of the board.

Western hearings of the Railway Commission will be held in Vancouver on April 7 and in Victoria April 11 to investigate the equalization of eastern and western freight rates.

UPPER SILESIA TO BE PART OF GERMANY

People Vote by Large Majority Against Joining Poland.

BERLIN, March 21.—Germany won an overwhelming victory in the plebiscite held in Upper Silesia to determine the future nationality and status of that region. There were 876,000 votes for Germany and 389,000 for Poland.

POLES THREATEN TO SHOOT BRITISH OFFICERS ON DUTY

WATOWITZ, Silesia, March 21.—Poles threatened to shoot some British officers detailed to police Schoppinitz during the voting in the Upper Silesia plebiscite. Two officers will take over the supervision of the polling stations.

MANY KILLINGS IN IRELAND AT THE WEEK END

Ambushes at Different Points and Casualties at All on Both Sides.

CORK, March 21.—Seven soldiers and one policeman were killed, several wounded and seven attackers were killed in an ambush near Kindale, according to latest reports. The fatalities to the crown forces were caused by the blowing up of bridges when three lorries were crossing. Twenty Sinn Feiners were captured.

There is a reign of terror at Cork. Farm houses and produce were burned as reprisals.

DUBLIN, March 21.—In an ambush at Castletownroche by 150 men, a constable was killed and some attackers wounded.

In another ambush near Dungoyan the fight lasted five hours and a constable was killed and several of the attackers were killed.

BELFAST, March 21.—Five hundred Sinn Feiners ambushed thirty soldiers, killing six and wounding five. Reinforcements arrived, the Sinn Feiners retreating and many falling. The district is in a ferment.

DUBLIN, March 21.—Crown forces lost eleven killed and eleven wounded in ambushes in Ireland over the weekend. It is believed that thirteen revolutionaries were killed and thirteen wounded. One private citizen was killed and one wounded by Sinn Feiners. Street rioting occurred at Belfast and Londonderry.

HOCKEY CHAMPS BEAT THE CALGARY TIGERS

CALGARY, March 21.—Ottawa Senators, the world's professional hockey champions, defeated the Calgary Tigers, champions of Alberta, by a score of 2 to 0 in an exhibition game here on Saturday.

CHAMBERLAIN IS UNIONIST LEADER IN THE COMMONS

LONDON, March 21.—Right Hon. Austen Chamberlain is to succeed Right Hon. Bonar Law as leader of the Unionist party in the House of Commons. He was elected at a Government caucus here today.

DEAD COMES BACK TO LIFE

Heart Ceased to Beat for Fourteen Hours, Then Man Awoke.

GENEVA, March 21.—The case of a man's heart ceasing to beat for fourteen hours and then resuming work is reported here. A clergyman named Baudenbacher died and after he was officially declared dead he suddenly awoke. His case is arousing much interest in this part of the country.

MUST HAVE \$250 ON LANDING IN CANADA

That is Text of Order-in-Council Passed at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, March 21.—An order-in-council has just been passed extending indefinitely the provisions of the order passed last November whereby immigrants of the mechanic artisan class, skilled or unskilled, is required to have \$250 on landing in Canada in addition to a ticket to the point of destination.

The city police had a call this morning from the residence of Louise Adams, Fulton St., where Harry Lathrop was alleged to have been doing wilful damage. Warden Bailey was despatched to the scene but on arrival found a door broken and his man gone.

Liquor Is Largest Item In Estimates for Year Presented by Minister

VICTORIA, March 21.—Of \$17,910,595 estimated revenue for the coming year shown in the estimates presented by Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, the profit on liquor sold under the liquor act is set down as the largest item, it being expected to bring in \$2,500,000. Other items mentioned are as follows:

Automobile licensees \$750,000 as against \$650,000 last year.

Amusement tax, \$350,000.

Income tax, \$1,050,000.

Wild land, coal and timber land tax, \$875,000.

Poll tax, \$235,000.

Succession duties, \$700,000.

Timber licenses, \$1,350,000.

Land sales, \$850,000.

Timber royalties, \$850,000.

Timber sales, \$300,000.

Of the expenditures, legislation will cost the province \$109,870. Prince Rupert gets \$200,000 for a new government building. Capital expenditure on mental hospitals will be \$227,100. Mothers' pensions will cost \$143,680. The educational department requires \$670,000, of which cities get \$100,000, municipalities \$137,500 and the rest goes to rural districts. The sum of \$60,000 is set aside for oil investigations.

ROBERSON IS TO COMMAND THE RUPERT

To Relieve on Prince George for Month, then Gets Permanent Command

When the Prince Rupert comes back into commission early in May she will be commanded by Capt. Roberson of this city, one of the pioneer officers of the service who is at present skipper of the Prince Albert.

Capt. Roberson will leave the Prince Albert in about a week and relieve Capt. Moorhouse from the Prince George in order for that officer to take a holiday.

This position he will retain until the George goes into dock, when the Rupert will take her place.

Capt. Roberson is a veteran of the sea and a pioneer in so far as Prince Rupert is concerned. He has been at sea 29 years, seven of which was in sailing craft, and part of it in India. He took part in suppressing the Boxer Rebellion in China, going there from India on a transport.

Accompanied by Mrs. Roberson, the Captain was one of the first white people to land on Kaien Island in connection with the founding of the city. He has seen service with the G.T.P. coast service since its inception, going first as chief officer on the Prince Albert with Capt. Barney Johnson. He then commanded the Henrietta and left her to go to the war where he engaged in mine sweeping, patrolling and escorting for two years and for two years more was in command of various "O" or mystery ships both sail and steam. He did valiant service with the navy and then returned to take charge of the Prince Albert. His promotion to the larger vessels will be a popular move. His plane will be taken on the Albert by Capt. Nedden.
