DEATH WAS

Coroner's Jury Probes Accident Which Occurred at Dry Dock Last Friday Night

The coroner's jury which yesterafternoon investigated the death of Duncan C. Shields, deckhand of the steamer Prince George, who lost his life last Friday night, returned a verdict to the effect that deceased came to his death as a result of accidentally falling from the gangplank of the steamer Canadian Seigneur at the local dry dock and, in striking the guard rail, fender piling or fender log below, suffered such external and internal injuries as to have caused almost instant death. The jury expressed the opinion that no blame was attachable to anyone in connection with the accident but recommended that such precautions be taken as may avoid repitition of such accidents. The inquest was conducted before Coroner Norman A. Watt. T. W. Brown held a watching brief as counsel for the Canadian National Steamships.

Witnesses were Dr. Cecil H. Hankinson, who attended deceased after the accident and who performed a post-mortem examination, which revealed a broken neck and other extensive injuries; Capt. J. R. Elfert, harbor master, who testified as to the nature and condition of . the gangway from which the accident occurred; Charles Gowland, who was going up the gangplank at putation as a writer of romantic James B.
