Prevent Much Unemployment.

The Daily News has had a good many people express approval of the suggestion that the government coal reserve be lifted in order to allow prospecting to become general. Now that there is much unemployment, the throwing open of the coal lands to prospectors, under such restrictions as may be thought desirable would help relieve the situation. While looking for coal, prospectors often find other minerals, in fact when a man is out in the hills he is always on the lookout for anything.

The lifting of the reserve on the lands at Fraser Lake is resulting in the development of the coal lands and will benefit Prince Rupert and the whole of the northern part of the province. Possibly it may not be necessary to go to the Groundhog to get coal for the coast supply. If Fraser Lake has it, there will be great developments at that point and also great developments at Prince Rupert, this port being the natural port for handling it.

Better Care For Children.

Dr. Young, provincial health officer, working under the direction of Dr. McLean, provincial secretary and minister of education, is taking up the matter of health of children and mothers and will devote a great deal of attention to it. We have spent much money in protecting cattle and hogs but little in protecting children. We have looked on property as being of more value than human life. Now we are changing our viewpoint. We are looking for a condition under which mothers will bear children under the best possible conditions so that the children may have every chance. We are working toward a condition under which the terrible waste of child life will be prevented and the adult population will be benefitted.

Population of Alaska Decreased.

The population of Alaska is decreasing, according to the official count, the result of which has just been made public. The American government tied up the natural resources of the territory and made it difficult for capital to operate there. The result was disastrous.

A similar condition may obtain in British Columbia. We find that within the last few months many industries have closed, mines are not being worked, mills are silent. This is partly the result of general conditions but also it is largely affected by the discouraging attitude toward businesses which are trying to develop the natural resources. The attitude of people in the north should be most sympathetic toward those who are willing to risk their money on development work. In the past millions of dollars have been wasted on schemes of development which have not made good. In our own neighborhood there have been wastages particularly in connection with the proposed power plant. A visit to Port Edward will make this clear. We do not want our population to decrease and it will not unless we assume a hostile attitude toward those who would spend their money here.

CONCERT WAS VERY FINE

Miss Mary Izard and Mrs. Morkill
Got Splendid Reception
Last Night.

There was a fairly large and most enthusiastic audience at the Westholme Theatre last evening at the Sunday night concert given under the management of J. F. Maguire with Miss Mary Izard of Victoria and Mrs. Dathy Morkill as visiting artists, and R. Greenfield and Meth Davies, cornet and vocal soloists respectively.

The feature of the evening was the violin playing of Miss Izard. The whole program was of a classical nature and particularly suited to a Sunday evening event. Miss Izard was ably accompanied by Mrs. Morkill. Mendelssohn's concerto, which is a violin and piano duet, was the feature of the evening and both parts were splendidly executed, the audience showing their appreciation by prolonged applause and insistent demands for more.

Possibly the Irish airs at the close were the most popular with the audience, but every selection Miss Izard played was well received and much enjoyed by the audience.

Meth Davies sang well and especially in the Welsh selection at the close.

Mr. Greenfield played "My Heart, at Thy Sweet Voice" on the cornet, an instrument of which he is a master.

It was announced by Mr. Maguire that there would be another concert given by the same artists next Sunday when there will be no admission fee, but a collection will be taken.
