King's Visit to Ulster Successful.

King George and Queen Mary have been in Belfast and have formally opened the new North Ireland Parliament. Their mission was successful in every respect and not a single untimely occurrence marred it. Despite the fact that there were several displays of violence in Ireland on the days previous to the visit of the King, which were said to be for the purpose of causing an abandonment of the visit, it was made. Many looked for deeds of violence and perhaps attempts at the life of the royal person but these expectations were relieved on the news being received that the royal party had made its visit and had gone. The King's speech delivered at the Belfast City Hall, where the parliament will have its sessions for the present, was an inspiring one. The hope expressed in it for a cessation of the disturbances on the stormy Isle is not alone the desire of the King, but it is the desire of the Empire generally. The personal visit of George V may have had some pacifying effect on the revolutionary spirit now prevailing in Ireland and it is certainly to be hoped that it will have had.

Britain Could Not Take Sides.

The insurance of Britain's non-participation in any war which may break out between the United States and Japan will have to be the keynote of a renewal of the Anglo-Japanese alliance. This will be the only practical basis upon which such a treaty can be entered into by the Empire. It may be essential for there to exist a written treaty between Britain and Japan but this will not be necessary between Britain and the United States. These two great English-speaking nations already have too many ties binding them together to allow for the contingency of war ever breaking out between them. Thus it is that while Japan and the United States continue to maintain the attitude of aloofness that at present prevails, Great Britain will have to be ensured against the possibility of being embroiled in any difficulties that may arise between them. The very fact that Britain cannot become involved on either side in such a case should tend to improve the feeling between them.

"Back to School" Campaign Starting.

The International Association of Rotary Clubs is now starting a "Back to School" campaign. Since Prince Rupert is a Rotary Club city it may be directly interested in the campaign. The campaign is launched particularly with a view to encouraging the attendance of boys at high school after the ordinary common school education has been finished. While Prince Rupert may not be so directly affected as other cities since there is not the great temptation for boys of this age to leave school as elsewhere, still it may be of some benefit in the city and even if it results in the sending of but one single boy to school, it will have been worth the effort. The smallest Rotary Club in the smallest town can do a great community service by organizing a "Back to School" campaign bringing into co-operation every agency in the city which may be interested in the boys in any way. It will confer an immeasurable benefit on the community.

GERMANY AND RUSSIA TRADE

Business Interests are Skeptical About Soviet Government.

COLOGNE, Germany, June 23. German business interests and the German press are extremely skeptical about the value of the preliminary trade agreement entered into with the Russian Soviet Republic by the German government and frankly declare there is little reason to hope for immediate trade with Russia on any considerable scale.

The fact that the Soviet Republic still insists upon monopolizing all import and export business and had the preliminary trade agreement written with that object in view confuses German business men, who profess to be unable to comprehend the document.

While the Soviet Republic takes to itself the rights and functions of a business corporation, it also holds to the well established international principle that a government cannot be sued, but endeavors to reassure business men who desire to do business with it by including in the preliminary agreement a stipulation that dealings between the Russian government and German firms and individuals in Russia are to be controlled by an arbitration court.

Still Far in Future.

In discussing the agreement the Cologne Gazette says: "This is the first step toward readjustment of business relations, the final step being still far in the future. Nevertheless, it is a step forward and others must necessarily follow. The new agreement means that the two business delegations—in Moscow and Berlin—must be essentially enlarged and clothed with more authority, An urgent warning should be issued against false hopes of great commercial advantage."

The German business men who put their faith in this agreement can have no guarantee of personal or property security, for the interpretation can be so distorted by the mental gymnasts of the red republic as to divert wholly its purpose. There is insufficient security offered for German life and property, which will in every instance be at the mercy of Bolshevik commissars."

MOVING PICTURE MEN ARRIVE IN RUPERT TO TAKE FISHERIES

E. M. Finn and E. J. Bach, of Ottawa, are Busy Today.

E. M. Finn and E. J. Bach, two moving picture men of the Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, reached the city a couple of days ago to take pictures of all phases of the fishing industry around Prince Rupert. Today, being the first real fine day since their arrival, they visited the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company's plant and other fish packing places along the waterfront and obtained a good many feet of fine film. Later they will go farther afield from this port.

When completed, the film will be exhibited all over the United States and Canada and then on other continents. The mission of these men may take them four months for they have been instructed to miss nothing. Last summer Mr. Finn and Mr. Bach spent on the Atlantic seaboard on similar work.
