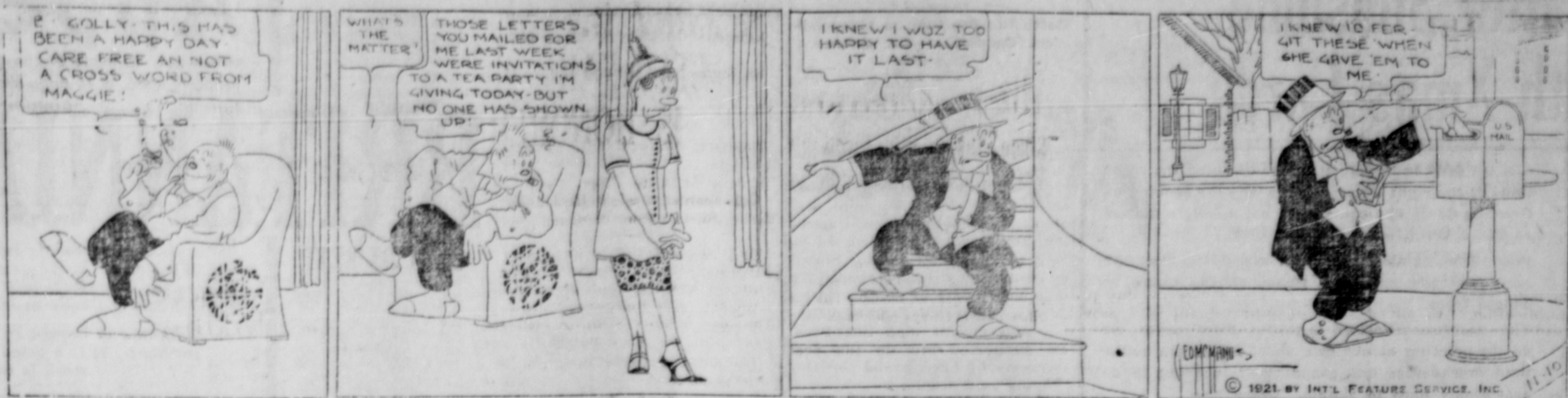

WHAT IS HIS POLICY?

Editor Daily News:

It strikes me as curious that correspondents at different times criticize and find fault with you because you do not give Col. Peck a lot of space and also report fully his political views and policy. Why should either a Liberal or Conservative paper which advocates the views of the party to which they adhere be expected to cater to or even advertise for a candidate who has no opportunity, but who is acting as an opportunist. Liberals and Conservatives are advocating and are soliciting votes for certain policies and the press of those parties are supposed to show the electors what the policies of their parties are. Then why should a Liberal paper be supposed to give the Colonel so much attention.

If as an independent he was advocating a certain policy distinct from either party I can understand why that policy might be laid before the electorate with a view to education. But when he says he is a Liberal and stands for election as an independent at the same time commanding the support of a large portion of the Conservative party, why should any paper of party leanings give him more than passing notices.

Should Know Policy.

Surely the time has arrived when every voter should know the policy of the candidate for whom he or she votes. Who knows what an independent may advocate when in parliament? He is not telling the public what he stands for, if elected, and if we are left to judge from his actions and the company he keeps we must conclude that only a few of the leading Conservatives know just what he has up his sleeve.

Despite the apparent independent attitude of Col. Peck, it appears to me that the Meigh-

en Government feels morally sure of his support if returned to power, otherwise we would have seen a straight Conservative contesting this constituency. Thanking you for space.

At the Ocean Falls Theatre Saturday evening, Col. Peck, V. C. and G. H. Nelson of Prince Rupert addressed a large audience. Mr. Nelson was the first speaker. He said among other things: He came to Ocean Falls to instruct the intelligent people as to what were the necessary qualifications in order to have one's name placed on the voters' list. We are indeed glad to think that Mr. Nelson was so generous and kind-hearted as to impart this valuable information to us.

Col. Peck, V.C. followed. He said he was running as an Independent Liberal; that he no longer adhered to the policies championed by Premier Meigher; that he was absolutely opposed to him in holding an election at the present time and that he was for many years a free trader. He touched on the cannery and fishing situation, spoke of the many public improvements he has been able to secure for the Skeena riding, and wound up his remarks by hurling vituperation and insults at Fred T.
