The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

POLAND AFTER RICH MINES

Plebiscite to Decide Fate of Upper Silesia to be Held Soon.

BEUTHEN, Upper Silesia, Mar. 1.—The campaign into which Poland has entered to gain control of the rich Upper Silesian industrial centres through a plebiscite victory, the middle of this month, is being directed from a rickety, three story hotel here which has been purchased by Wojciech Korfanty, director of Polish propaganda, plastered with anti-German placards, filled with propagandists and guarded from outside and inside, day and night, by armed men.

Korfanty himself, who formerly was a member of the Reichstag, and now is the bugbear of the German mine owners here, has offices in the building, but they are available only to those who have unquestionable credentials. German residents and officials leave him severely alone.

Some of the huge posters in the building are relics of war propaganda, one of them picturing three old women before a firing squad of German soldiers. Under the placard is the legend, "Glosuy za polska"—vote for Poland—and under this the same legend is written in German. All the posters in addition to the Polish legends are interpreted in German, for many of the people of Polish extraction cannot speak the Polish language.

Korfanty received the Associated Press correspondent with a brisk and cheerful greeting. He was dressed in neatly tailored clothes, affected a monocle and was surrounded by many assistants, one of whom stood immediately back of him during the whole of the conversation.

In view of the Polish exchange situation, Polish money selling then at ten to one in favor of the German mark, and reports of unemployment and financial distress in Poland, Korfanty was asked what benefits the working population of Upper Silesia could expect from a union with Poland.

"The Upper Silesian question is not a problem in economy, but in nationality," he said. "The majority of these people are Poles and their sympathies are with Poland. Poland's situation will improve. In the meantime we will break up this feudal system here by which the German mine owners have oppressed Polish workmen for 400 years. Seventy-five per cent of the German officials of Upper Silesia will, of course, vote for Germany, but we will have an overwhelming majority in the elections."

P. E. I. FARMERS

Movement in Island is Mostly Co-operative

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Mar. 1.—The seed of the agrarian movement is being sown broadcast over the three counties of Prince Edward Island. The movement, unlike that spreading throughout other parts of the Dominion, is up to the present almost non-political in character and confines its attention pretty largely to economic problems, chief of which is the co-operative buying and selling proposition.

A resolution looking toward the betterment of transportation facilities which was unanimously passed by the Convention, condemned the Canadian National Railways for high passenger and freight rates. Other resolutions strongly urge the standardization of the gauge of the P. E. I. Railway and the building of a second car-ferry steamer to improve the island-mainland service.
