WORK OF RED CROSS IN B. C.

Great Assistance Given Families of War Heroes.

Some idea of the manifold activities of the Red Cross in British Columbia may be had by citing a few of the outstanding features of its work.

Among the most important is the assistance it has rendered the soldier-dependents. Beginning with the provision of automobiles to meet every train arriving with soldiers and their families aboard, many of these men and their dependents have had the special care of the Society in re-establishing them in civil life. In many cases soldiers who have taken up land through the Soldier Settlement Board, have been supplied with wearing apparel, blankets, and other household goods to enable them to make a fair start. Transportation has often been provided to enable the wives to attend courses in dairying, poultry keeping, horticulture or home economics and many families have been immensely benefited thereby. Very many cases of sickness in soldier families have had the special care of the Red Cross. In some instances hospital treatment has been necessary, and it has been the duty of the society to make provision for the wife while her soldier husband was under treatment.

Emergency Department.

In connection with the Society's Disaster and Emergency Relief, there are in course of formation a number of emergency depots and it is planned to have these established throughout the Province at convenient strategic points, so that in the event of disastrous fire or other calamity, relief supplies can be rushed at once to the scene. The invaluable service that can be rendered by every Red Cross branch in emergencies was well exemplified during the plague of Spanish Influenza, when nursing service was provided as well as medical supplies and many other needs.

It would be impossible to give a complete list here of the supplies provided by the Vancouver branch of the Society during the year ending September, 30, 1920, but a few of the leading items may be cited:—Blankets, 175, pairs of gloves 90, handkerchiefs 464, nightshirts 21, overcoats 14, pillow cases 176, pajamas 1943, pairs of sheets 128, top shirts 563, pairs of slippers 247, pairs of socks 2922, walking sticks 119, sweaters 879, suits of underwear 540, towels 144, Christmas hampers 22, etc.

Another activity of the Red Cross in B. C. has been the establishment of a Red Cross Chair of Public Health in the University of B. C., where nurses may have the necessary training in matters of public health. During the year already mentioned eight nurses were placed in charge of districts as follows:—Sayward, V. L.; Merville, V.L.; Gowichian, V.L.; Colwood, V.L.; Waldo, in the East Kootenays; Magna Bay and Gelista on Shuswap Lake; East Arrow Park on the Arrow Lakes; and Creston in the West Kootenays.

FISHING BOAT TETON SINKS

Lies in 60 Fathoms of Water at Banks Island.

Captain and Crew Had Time Saving Their Lives.

A total loss, the Canadian fishing schooner Teton lies submerged in sixty fathoms of water near Deadman's Point, Banks Island, as a result of an explosion which occurred on the vessel on Friday evening about 6 o'clock. The crew was fortunately saved and there was no loss of life although the men had to leave the boat hastily and make for shore in a leaky skiff. The boat is valued at \$8,000 and this is partially covered by \$5,000 insurance in the Union of Canton Insurance Co., of Vancouver.

The Teton left Prince Rupert for the fishing grounds at 3 o'clock on Friday morning and, reaching White Rock light about 5 o'clock in the evening, the setting of gear was commenced and the boat ended up at Deadman's Point about 6 o'clock.

Explosion Occurs.

At about this time Captain Henry Henriksen, the skipper of the Teton, observed what he thought to be water in the engine room. He advised the engineer, Forest Fryer, at once who went to the engine room to investigate and found out that it was distillate which the captain had noticed. Fryer told the captain that he would at once bale out the boat, but just at that moment, either the engine must have back-fired or there was a short circuit in the ignition system, for there was an explosion which carried the captain overboard and burned the engineer, who was standing in the engine room hatchway, severely about the neck and head.

Captain Henriksen, from the water, advised the rest of the crew to get the skiff into the water at once and get clear of the boat for he was afraid that another explosion might occur. After some difficulty the skiff was put into the water bottom up and the crew had to jump. Finally, righting the skiff and picking up some floating oars, all were able to make shore two miles off, baiting the little craft constantly for the bung of the boat was missing and the hole had to be filled up with a carriage bolt and rags.

Impossible To Save Boat.

No attempt could be made to save the vessel as she caught fire immediately after the explosion. Fearing that another explosion might occur at any time the only thing to do was for the captain and crew to save
