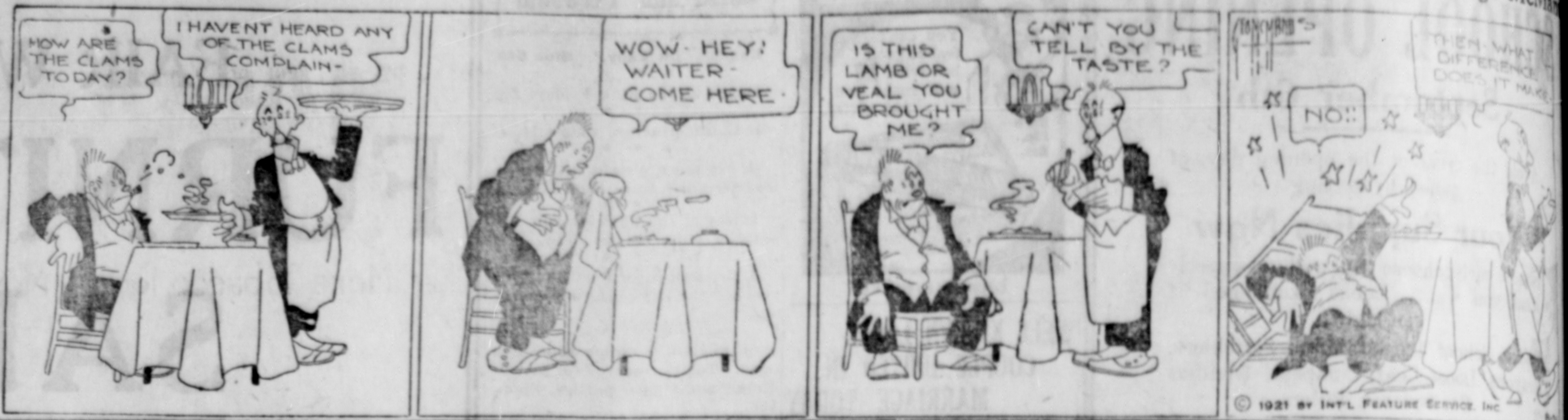

### SMITHERS

Smithers and Telkwa people enjoyed immensely the program presented by the artists and lecturers of the Dominion Chautauqua Company that has just completed its visit to this town. The musical talent was of a high order and the conjuring entertainment by the De Jens set everybody wondering how it was done. The dominant note struck by all the lecturers was the necessity of preserving the good feeling and mutual trust that exists between the great English-speaking peoples, and which the Hearst press and other pro-Teuton organizations are trying their worst to impair. Capt. Imrie in his lecture "Problems Confronting Uncle Sam and John Bull" gave a wonderfully vivid resume of Anglo-American history from the time of Columbus' great discovery to the present day. The Irish situation was graphically dealt with, and all who listened to the brilliant and witty speaker went away with a clearer idea of this, the paramount problem of John Bull.

A united service was held on Sunday, August 28 at the Smithers Hall, participated in by the Anglican and Methodist ministers, when about 200 people listened with rapt attention to a stirring address by Miss Leque Coleman, a lady lecturer of the Chautauqua company.

J. L. Wilson and oldtimer of the Clontanna district sustained a painful fracture of the right leg when thrown from a horse at Telkwa today. He has been admitted to the Bulkley Valley Hospital and is under the care of Drs. Hawkinson and Garrioch.

At the Smithers Citizens' Association meeting held on Friday last, the burning question of fire protection was once more noted. F. Ackleshaw had canvassed the business section of the town to obtain contributions towards the purchase of much needed appliances and obtained a fairly generous response. Further contributions are needed however, and a committee was appointed to take the matter in hand.

Excellent conditions for harvesting splendid crops are reported from all the districts in the vicinity of Prince George. Haying is now nearly finished and the taking in of other crops is well under way.

### STEWART

Under the management of R. L. Clothier, the preliminary development work on the Silverado Mine, recently bonded to Vancouver interests by John Haati, has commenced. A crew of fifteen men under Jim Lade has started trail building and D. B. Morkill has been surveying for the tram line. This winter it is intended to hawhide the ore down and 25 or 30 men will be kept working all the time.

Stewart has been granted free space for exhibits at the American Mining Congress exhibition to be held next month. A great district collection is being prepared.

A 20 by 20 extension is to be built to the Stewart dock and the warehouse is also to be enlarged.

The liquor store here is to be located in the old bank of Commerce building.

D. A. Jay, of the Prince Rupert branch of the Bank of Montreal, is relieving J. M. Wilson, of the local branch, while he is away on three weeks' holidays.

Road Foreman Henry Scovil is rushing the work of repairing the wing dam above the bridge on Bear River. Commencement of other road work to be done in the district this season is postponed until the arrival of George Young, general foreman, from Alice Arm.

### CANCELLATION OF RESERVE

Notice is hereby given that the reserve against the acquisition of Coal under the Coal and Petroleum Act established by notice dated 11th of February, 1923, and published in the British Columbia Gazette on the 17th of February, 1923, is cancelled except in so far as the same relates to the following areas:

1. All the lands lying within the boundary of the drainage areas of the Skeena River, above and including north Creek, the East Fork of the Naik River, the Little Klappen River, and the Spatsizi River, above and including Klappet and Indian Creeks.

2. All that portion of Vancouver Island lying westerly of the following described boundaries:

Commencing at a point on the West Coast of the Island at the mouth of Muir Creek, thence following the westerly boundary of the Esquimalt and Nanaimo Railway Belt to the southeasterly corner of the Strathcona Park Reserve, thence along the westerly boundary of the said reserve to its southwesterly corner, thence north following the boundary of the said reserve to its northwesterly corner, thence west to the south boundary of Hayward and Rupert Districts to the westerly boundary of the watershed of Nimpkish River, thence westerly along the westerly boundary of the watershed of said Nimpkish River, Nimpkish Lake, and Loch River to the south boundary of Township 37, Rupert District, thence west along the south boundary of Townships 37, 41 and 44 to the Pacific Ocean, and including all the forests and lands covered by water adjacent to the East Coast of Vancouver Island, together with all islands lying between the National of the Province south of the 51st parallel of north latitude and Vancouver Island and all the lands within the boundary of the Districts of Clallam, Goldstream, Metcalfe, Esquimalt, Victoria, Lake and North and South Saanich, Sooke and Highland.

The cancellation of this reserve shall not take effect and staking for coal shall not be lawful until notice of such cancellation is published in the British Columbia Gazette and in a newspaper published or circulating in each of the Land Registration Districts of the Province of B. C.

This notice shall in no wise affect the reserve against the acquisition of Coal, Petroleum and Natural Gas in the Peace River District, established by notice in the British Columbia Gazette on the 27th of March, 1918, which reserve is still in force and effect.
