Why Not C. P. R. Operate Road.

If the Canadian National Railway does not want to use the line between Prince Rupert and Edmonton, why not open negotiations with the C. P. R. with a view to either selling or leasing it to them. There seems to be little desire on the part of the National System to develop this part of the country and to give us that attention to which we are entitled. On the other hand there have been rumors that the C. P. R. has on more than one occasion sent men here to investigate the possibilities of the port. The big railway corporation is in the habit of using any railway it happens to own and trying to make it pay. If the C. P. R. came here we could expect to see more business moving and efforts made to develop this port and the country surrounding it.

Another Fish Catch Of Large Proportions.

A dozen cars of fish arrived yesterday but was not sold owing to the cars not being available. Today, however, much of the halibut will be shipped away. The trend of business is toward this port and the railway company is apparently making an effort to get the cars to handle it, but the time will come soon when the cars will be needed on the other side of the line and then we shall be in the old position. We cannot expect to live on borrowed rolling stock.

We shall all be interested to see the first of the new refrigerators coming into the yard for it will be a harbinger of better conditions.

Paying Checks Outstanding.

People around town are much gratified at receiving the money on the pay checks they cashed. When the yard shut down, merchants and others who were able to do so tried to help out the workmen by cashing their pay checks. Every effort was made to satisfy them. It was thought that if they did this, the Government would come to the rescue in the near future. When orders were received that only those who held their own checks would be paid, people were disappointed. They have had to wait a long time for the money but at last it has been forthcoming.

Good Progress on Local Dock.

Good progress is being made on the new salmon dock. Piles are being driven and the structure is gradually showing itself to be a very imposing one and should prove most useful to the port. It is to be hoped that the work will be completed in the near future and that there will be no delay in completing the superstructure, plans for which were prepared before the work commenced.

The business between this port and Alaska should be most important. While efforts are made from time to time by the companies and others interested to prevent the natural flow of trade to this port, it cannot be shut off permanently if proper facilities for it are provided.

TENDER IS AWARDED TO BLOW UP STEAMER

Campania Blocks Fairway in Firth of Forth and Must Be Destroyed

The Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses have been authorized by the Marine Department of the Board of Trade to accept a tender for blowing up the wreck in the Firth of Forth of H.M.S. Campania, formerly of the Cunard Line. This is believed to be the largest work of its kind which has ever been undertaken says the British Board of Trade Journal.

H.M.S. Campania, equipped as a seaplane carrier, was damaged in a gale in 1918, and sank off Burntisland Harbor. She has been abandoned by the Admiralty, and as the wreck leaves a clear main passage up the Firth of less than half a mile it forms a serious danger to navigation. Her upper works come practically up to the level of low water spring tides. The wreck is in the general fairway of the Firth and cannot reasonably be held to be in or near an approach to any particular harbor.

The duty of removing it therefore falls on the Commissioners, who are the general lighthouse and wreck removing authority for Scotland. The Commissioners' engineer advised that the vessel could not be raised or removed at a reasonable cost, and 14 companies were therefore asked to tender for cutting the vessel down to 45 feet at low water. Only three tenders were received. The Board of Trade submitted the tenders and the proposals to the Corporation of Trinity House in view of their wide experience in recent years in removing wrecks and the Elder Brethren have recommended that the lowest tender should be accepted. The Commissioners have therefore been authorized to accept that tender which was sent in by a Sunderland firm.

The Campania, which was built in 1893, is of 12,834 gross tonnage. The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
