WANDERERS WINNERS BY NARROW MARGIN

Prince Rupert are Still Far Ahead in Billiards for the Mc-Mordie Cup.

The Wanderers Club was successful by the narrow margin of 1428 to 1417 over the Prince Rupert in the fourth of the four-nights for the McMordie Cup which was played on Saturday night. Each club was successful in winning three games and the scores were generally quite close.
